### Revised Flag Pledge Told

To dispel public confusion in the revised pledge of allegiance to the flag, Jack Benner, Americanism chairman of Klamath Falls Legion Post No. 8, and Mrs. Loy Barker of its auxiliary have requested publication of the new version.

The words "under God" were included in a new law, signed by President Eisenhower on Flag Day, June 14 of this year. Members of clubs, teachers, students, and the public are urged to learn continuity of the pledge.

The revised pledge reads: "I pledge allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America and to the Republic for which it stands, one Nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."

A salute to the gesture used when the flag passes and the pledge is the verbal promise of the Armistice Day in Veterans' Day by order of Public Law 380, November 11 will still be set aside for observance of memorials to veterans of all wars. This change became effective June 1, 1954.

LONE PINE, Calif. — Rescuers today brought down from 14,496-foot Mt. Whitney an injured climber, Henry Mandolf of San Diego, who fell 200 feet to a ledge.

Mandolf suffered an arm fracture, abrasions and possible internal injuries as he lost his footing on an icy trail. He was trapped on the ledge for 25 hours in 18-degree cold before his 14-year-old companion, James Prichard of San Diego, walking all night to Whitney Portal for help summoned forest rangers and sheriff deputies. An airplane directed the 17-man searching party to the ledge.
