Merrill City Council Meets

MERRILL — Councilman Harvey Denton presided at Thursday evening's meeting of the Merrill City Council in the absence of Mayor Bob Walker. Councilman and watermaster Paul Lewis reported that the pump in the city water tower is inadequate to supply the water demand, especially during the summer months, but with two new stages added, it would be possible to pump 600 gallons per minute. He was authorized to make the needed improvements to the pump.

City recorder Gus Thompson advised that the city's water meter book will be closed on October 15, and anyone not already registered to use in the city must file a map by that date. Anyone wishing to run for city office must file their petitions with the city recorder by October 15.

In concluding the evening's business two building permits were issued: the first to E. E. Mackay, \$1,000, addition to house, and the second to R. A. Smith, \$300, for a garage.

Others present at the session were councilmen Lewis, Howard Dewey, and Louis Stewart, police judge George Williams, recorder, Gus Thompson, and marshals, Doug Brunson.

Cause Of Fire Investigated

City police and fire department officials have started an extensive investigation into the cause of a fire, which may have been set in the rear of the apartment occupied by **Don Lyman**, 1980 Reclamation. The entire apartment was broken into Saturday night and considerable damage done to the furniture and walls.

The fire was discovered shortly before midnight last night when Mrs. Kay Kraus, who lives in an upstairs apartment, smelled smoke. Opening the door to the room where her small baby was asleep, she found the room smoke-filled. Grabbing a blanket she wrapped it around the child and made her way downstairs just as flames broke into the child's room.

In reconstructing the scene, Fire Chief Rowe stated that a roommate of Lyman's, **Jack Sellers**, had telephoned city police about 11:30 when he discovered a bottle inside the screen door of the apartment. Inside the bottle was a note with the initials "J.P.P.C."

About 11:30 Mrs. Kraus called neighbors and called her husband who was working. He told her she was probably jumping from the fire-escape sign and advised her to return to bed.

Sellers stated he left the downstairs apartment about 11:30 p.m. to go to work and a short time afterwards Mrs. Kraus discovered fire.

Considerable damage resulted from the fire, according to Rowe, who said the loss might run as high as three to four thousand dollars.

The apartment of Lyman and Sellers was a shantieside Saturday night after it was broken into, eggs taken from the refrigerator, broken on the rug and furniture and thrown on the ceiling and walls.

Laborer Asks Hearing
