Portland School Rolls Increase PORTLAND — Total enrollment in Portland public schools on the opening day Tuesday was 60,713—2,016 more than on the opening day last year. More than two-thirds of the total—46,062 were in grade schools while 14,651 registered for high school. The final enrollment is expected to be about 64,000.

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
