Georgia Vote Backs Griffin

ATLANTA 12 — Lt. Gov. Marvin Griffin, the self-styled "White People's Candidate," was swept to an apparently overwhelming victory in Wednesday's Democratic primary for the nomination as governor of Georgia.

Running with the blessing of Gov. Herman Talmadge, whose white supremacy championship he is pledged to continue, Griffin piled up a huge lead for all-important county unit votes — allotted to the counties on the basis of two units for each seat in the state House of Representatives.

Former Gov. M. E. Thompson, who twice unsuccessfully opposed Talmadge, was far back in second place, still clinging to a fading hope that later returns might pull him into a runoff.

But on the basis of latest returns, from 1,240 of 1,806 precincts in 122 of the counties, Griffin had an apparently insurmountable lead of 134,868 popular votes which gave him the lead in counties with 282 of the state's 410 county unit votes. Only 206 unit votes are required for nomination.

Thompson had 104,441 and led in counties having 54 unit votes.

Detroit Strike Violence Flares

DETROIT 12 — A congressional probe was promised Tuesday as violence once again flared briefly at the struck Square D Co.

It was the second such disorder at the Detroit electrical apparatus firm since the company began a back-to-work movement Friday. The company action seeks to bring to an end a long strike of 1,200 Independent United Electrical Workers.

However, no one was injured. Two pickets were arrested in the latest melee. One of them, Philip Baba, is an organizer for the union. The other, Ed Perkols, is a former president of the striking local.

CHICAGO 12 — Rye turned wheat weaker and the rest of the grain market presented a mixed picture on the board of trade Thursday.

Rye was bought largely on hopes of exports. Wheat sank under mild hedging pressure, ignoring more reports of additional damage to the Canadian crop.

Price changes in corn were small, but the grain was ahead most of the day. Norway bought 120,000 bushels of corn. September soybeans rose sharply toward the finish on short covering.

Wheat closed 1 1/2, 3 1/2 cents lower, Sept. 2.17, corn 1 1/2, 1 1/2 higher, Sept. 1.65; main 1/4, lower in 1 1/2 higher, Sept. 1.47, soybeans 1 1/2 to 1 cent higher, Sept. 1.06 1/2, and hard 18 to 20 cents a hundred pounds higher, Sept. 17.00-17.25.

In the cattle section steers sold steady to \$1.00 lower and heifers steady to 50 cents down. A few lots of prime steers brought \$27.00 to \$28.25, the top. Most good and choice kinds moved at \$21.00 to \$24.00. Good to high choice butchers were taken at \$19.50 to \$24.00.

Lambs held steady, buyers paying \$11.50 to \$20.50 for good and choice native spring types.

Red Cross Plans Meeting

Red Cross chapters throughout the state of Oregon have been invited to send representatives to Eugene September 20th for an all day workshop in the Home Service program. Mrs. Orin Smead, local program chairman, announced at the committee meeting September 20th. Partnership Plan Backed

PORTLAND 12 — The same kind of partnership that developed the Pacific Northwest's forests now is being proposed for the power development of the Northwest's rivers, Rep. Harry Ellsworth (R-Ore.) asserted here Wednesday night.

He told the American Forestry Assn. that a partnership of "private forest owners, state and federal governments" had developed the region's forestry program successfully.

"The Eisenhower administration is recommending the same kind of partnership for development of the great, unexplored hydroelectric potential of the Columbia River," he said.

Ellsworth spoke of the program in handling forest resources, starting with the first organized efforts to control fires 80 years ago, to sustained yield practices of recent years.

"We are reclaiming from sawmill and plywood refuse more than a half-billion board feet of wood each year for use in pulp and hardwood mills. We are cleaning up the forest floor better each year," he said.

Delbert Stewart, 39-year-old itinerant laborer, charged with robbing blind news vendor Pete Jones, was ordered held for the county grand jury on a felony charge Thursday by District Judge D. E. Van Vactor.

The judge held Stewart at the conclusion of a preliminary hearing. Under questioning by Deputy District Attorney Robert Kerr, Jones told the court how Stewart became friendly with him and subsequently looted his news stand at the courthouse.

Stewart was arrested by Clarence Champlin, Southern Pacific railroad investigator. Subsequently he was taken to a police headquarters admitting theft of \$40 in cash and a large quantity of merchandise from the blind man.
