STOCKS

NEW YORK — The stock market was a little higher Friday in the late afternoon. There were a few vigorous gains. Some went to around 2 points. Most rises were measured in fractions. Losses at the most extended to between 1 and 2 points.

Trading came to an estimated 1,500,000 shares. That compares with 1,700,000 shares traded Thursday in a moderately higher market.

Eisenhower Meets With GOP Heads

DENVER — President Eisenhower arranged a political meeting today and aides predicted more of the same sort of restrained campaigning he has been carrying on for continued Republican control of Congress.

He scheduled a breakfast session with the GOP chairman of 21 Midwestern and Rocky Mountain states.

The Republican leaders are meeting in Denver, the President's vacation headquarters, to figure out how best to try to elect party candidates to the House and Senate in November.

White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerty told newsmen the President had no advance plans for any speech at the meeting.

Eisenhower told Washington news conferences weeks ago he would do no campaigning for individual Republican candidates for Congress.

He said that instead he planned to get around the country this summer and fall to plug the record of his administration and the 83rd GOP-run Congress.

So far he has been doing just that. Party candidates have come away from the summer White House saying the President has wished them luck in their campaigns and that he wants them to win.

But since he came to Colorado Aug. 21 for a work and play vacation there have been no out-and-out Eisenhower statements endorsing individuals.

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Local Motorist Loses License

An 80-year-old motorist accused of leaving the scene of an accident had his driver's license confiscated Friday in District Judge D. E. Van Vactor's court.

The defendant, Edward Vandenberg, told the judge he had been operating an automobile since 1914 and had never before been arrested for a traffic law violation. He was charged with failing to stop after his automobile collided with a parked car on South Sixth St. belonging to Larry Parsons.

"It is my opinion you should not be driving a car," Judge Van Vactor told the defendant. "I am going to recommend that your driver's license be revoked."

The judge also imposed a \$50 fine on Vandenberg which was suspended.

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Vandenberg Observes 30th Year As KF Lawyer, Judge

The hands of time, in fancy, turned back Thursday for Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg. He celebrated 30 years as a member of the Oregon Bar and, in a retrospective mood, recalled his early days as a struggling young lawyer.

Shortly after he was admitted to the bar on September 9, 1924 following graduation from Northwestern Law School in Portland, the judge came to Klamath Falls. His first job was deputy district attorney for Klamath County.

"The first case I handled as deputy district attorney involved two well-known bootleggers," Judge Vandenberg said. "I got a conviction and the illicit liquor vendors were sentenced to six months in jail and fined \$500 each."

Times have certainly changed. Today those fellows would be classed as legitimate business men.

Judge Vandenberg's tenure in the district attorney's office was brief. He entered private practice and during the interval between hanging out his shingle and being elected to the bench, he established an enviable record of acquittals.

The judge was born July 11, 1899 in Chicago. He spent his early youth in Wisconsin Rapids, Wisconsin. In 1913 the future judge's father moved his family to Panama. He was employed by the United States government as a railroad official in the Canal Zone.

Looking back over the years, the judge said one of his biggest thrills was the trip from New York to the canal on the SS Panama. After a year in Panama, the Vandenberg returned to the United States and settled in Portland. Adversity struck the family and the judge had to start shifting for himself. He worked his way through high school as a messenger for the Western Union. While in law school, he was employed nights in the office of an oil company.

During his years on the bench, Judge Vandenberg said he has become a firm believer in probation. "Once a man goes to the penitentiary," he added, "his chances for reformation are almost nil. All a state prison does is hold him away from society."

"The majority of serious offenders are not adults," he continued. "They are youths ranging from 17 to 19 years old. As far as that class of criminal is concerned, most of them really never had a chance. They lacked proper homes and training in their childhood. Nine out of 10 juvenile criminals have only one regret—that they were caught. Lack of parental care is responsible for 90 per cent of juvenile crime."

During questioning of the men at the county jail, they informed officers they had also cashed a phony check at a local Safeway store for \$87. This check was written on a California bank and has not yet been returned here, police stated.

District Attorney Frank Alderman this morning directed Sheriff Murray (Red) Britton to release the men to Sheriff Gillick due to the numerous check charges against them in California.

The men are held in the county jail pending arrival of officers from Oroville.



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
