NEW YORK (AP) — Crown Zellerbach Corp. big Pacific Coast pulp and paper maker, reported Friday for three months ended July 31 record high net income of \$7,810,989, equal to \$1.03 a share and compared with \$6,280,064 or 99 cents a share in the like period a year ago. There were 7,260,094 shares outstanding this year against 6,289,036 a year ago.

Sales of \$76,476,221 were second only to the record set in the second quarter last year and compared with \$70,281,778 in the comparable period a year earlier.
