Churches Plan Aid Program

Churches of the Klamath Basin with the cooperation of the Oregon Council of Churches will conduct an educational and recreational ministry for the agricultural migrant families that will come to this area during the potato harvest this year.

Announcement of the plan came this week from Betty Jane Whitaker, state supervisor of the Oregon Migrant Ministry for the Oregon Council of Churches, who is here to make preparations for the program.

Present plans call for Sunday Church School, church services, recreational activities for all ages, club groups, evenings of movies for all the family, thrift sales, principally of used clothing and bedding. Movies will be cartoons, educational and health films and religious features.

Over 350 health kits have already been completed to be used with the health films on general health, dental care and nutrition. These small terry cloth bags with drawstrings in bright striped colors, contain a wash cloth, tooth brush and tooth paste, soap, comb and Kleenex. Mrs. Marie E. Seddon, Klamath Falls, member of the council has been in charge of this feature of the program.

Miss Whitaker is assisting the local committees set up the programs for the Malin Farm Labor camp, the Newell Farm Labor camp and the trailer park, near Tulelake. She has been assigned to the Oregon Migrant Ministry by the Western regional office of the Division of Home Missions, National Council of Churches, which

carries such programs in 25 different states.

Marjorie Mann, Newport, Washington will arrive here September 15 to take over direction of the local plans. She will remain until October 20. She has had extensive experience with similar programs elsewhere and particularly with migrant families of California. She has just completed directing the migrant ministry in the Santa Clara Valley of California. Local volunteers will assist her. A local committee will meet in Klamath Falls in the near future to discuss how the community can help in meeting the needs of these migrants through the proposed programs.
