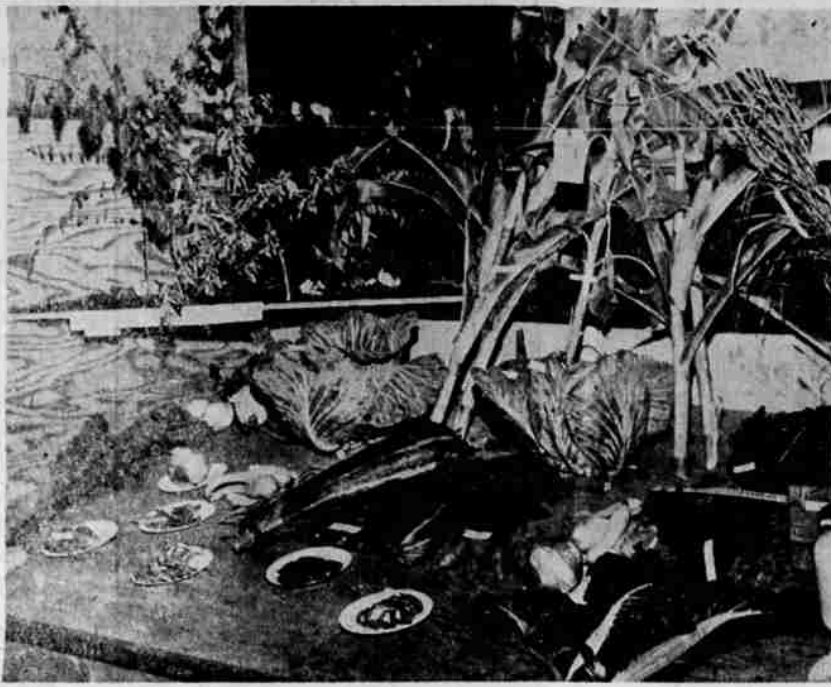

Cool Weather Over Midwest

Cool and wet weather prevailed over broad areas in the Midwest and northeast Tuesday but fairly pleasant weather was the outlook for most other parts of the country.

Skies were cloudy from the central Dakotas eastward across Minnesota, northern Iowa, Wisconsin, northern Illinois, lower Michigan and northern Indiana. Light rain or showers were reported in most of the central and southern sections of the cloudy area.

Light rain was widespread over most of New York state and the New England area. There were thunderstorms from the Texas panhandle northwestward to eastern Colorado.

Skies also were cloudy in western Washington and over Florida but fair to partly cloudy weather was reported in other sections.

The cool belt extended from the central Pacific Coast eastward across the Northern Rockies, northern Great Plains, the Great Lakes region, New York State and

New England. Temperatures were in the 40s in northern sections of Minnesota, Wisconsin and Michigan.

But it was warm in most of the south, southern great plains and in the southwest desert region.

Early morning temperatures ranged from 77 at New Orleans to 36 at Washington, N. H., and 37 at West Yellowstone, Mont. Other readings: New York 62;

Miami 75; Seattle 53; Los Angeles 64; Denver 61; Jackson, Mich., 58; Madison, Wis., 57; Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., 41; Chicago 67.



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
