Cloudy Skies Cover Nation

Skies were cloudy over broad areas of the country Wednesday. There were light showers in many sections.

An extensive cloud cover was reported early Wednesday stretching from the eastern Dakotas and Nebraska across the upper Mississippi Valley and the Great Lakes region into the middle Atlantic states and southern New England. Erie, Pa., fell in the northern Mississippi Valley while showers hit the lower Great Lakes region.

There also was considerable cloudiness in the northern Rockies and the Pacific Northwest, with light rain in western parts of Washington and Oregon. Another cloud belt extended over South Carolina, Georgia and Florida. Showers fell in parts of Florida.

A thunderstorm hit Dodge City, Kan., but fair weather was reported in parts of Florida.

It was cool in northern midwest areas and in sections of eastern New York and most of New England. It was below freezing—29 degrees—early Wednesday at Mt. Washington, N. H. Readings in the cool belt were in the 40s while in most of the southland temperatures were in the 70s. They were in the 80s in the southwest desert region.

Early morning conditions: New York 58 and cloudy; Miami 78 and cloudy; Dallas 78 and clear; Denver 61 and partly cloudy; Los Angeles 64 and clear; Seattle 56 and rain; Battle Creek, Mich., 59 and cloudy; Wausau, Wis., 49 and rain; Duluth, Minn., 43; Chicago 64 and cloudy.

ATTACK

Eisenhower Administration Predicts Fiscal Year Debt

WASHINGTON (U) — The Eisenhower administration has boosted the deficit it foresees for this fiscal year to nearly 4 1/2 billion dollars even while slashing a new 3 billion from major security programs.

But it has upped planned outlays in a dozen civilian fields where they could be a spur to production and employment.

The annual revision of spending and income estimates for the current fiscal year, which began July 1, was made public last night, indicating these over-all changes:

Total spending was reduced from the \$65,600,000,000 planned when President Eisenhower submitted the fiscal 1955 budget to Congress last January to a new estimate of \$64 billion. This compares with the spending of \$67,000,000,000 in the fiscal year which ended June 30.

The estimate of net budget receipts was cut from \$62,700,000,000 in January to \$59,300,000,000. Principle factors contributing to the reduction were congressional tax cuts bigger than expected refunds, and a sharp drop in corporation tax payments. Collections last fiscal year came to \$64,800,000,000. Since the \$3,400,000,000 dip in expected revenues outweighed the \$1,600,000,000 cut in spending, the administration's estimate of its probable deficit at the end of the fiscal year rose from \$2,900,000,000 predicted in January to \$4,700,000,000. In fiscal 1954, red ink spending came to 3 billions.

However, Secretary of the Treasury Humphrey told a news conference the administration would try "every day, every week and every month" to chop spending where it would hurt neither defense nor the economy.

And W. J. McNeil, assistant secretary of defense and chief fiscal officer of the Pentagon, told newsmen that despite the new reduction in defense spending, industry would get about twice the volume of defense contracts this year that it received last year. This action, by putting an increased flow of defense contracts in the pipeline, would tend to spur production and employment.

Secretary Humphrey said, "we are seeking more defense for less money, rather than changing the state of our defenses."

Eisenhower's January forecasts to Congress for security outlays this year were revised along these lines:

Total "major national security program" outlays — including direct military spending, military aid to Allies, atomic energy activities and stockpiling of strategic materials — will be \$41,900,000,000 this year instead of \$44,900,000,000 programmed last January. The new estimate represented a \$3,000,000,000 drop from last fiscal year and a decline of \$8,300,000,000 from peak defense outlays after the outbreak of fighting in Korea.

The revision of the January direct military spending estimates cut this biggest national security spending category down from 37 1/2 billion dollars to 35 1/2 billions.

To make this cut, McNeil said, Army outlays were cut from 10 1/2 billions to 9 1/2 billions, with the biggest part of the reduction in Army procurement of ammunition, ships and boats.

McNeil said the Air Force, which has the biggest service budget, absorbed some 800 million dollars of the cut, dropping from 16 1/2 billions to 15 1/2 billions. Some 300 millions of the cut would be taken out of aircraft purchasing, 325 millions from airfield and other public works programs, and 190 millions from maintenance and operations.

McNeil said the Navy was cut from 10 1/2 billion dollars to about 10 1/4 billions. The Navy retrenchment would be in spending for maintenance and operations.
