Director Resumes Work On 'Oklahoma' Film Version

 HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Time for a checkup on "Oklahoma!"
 Filming of the great Rodgers and Hammerstein musical has resumed in Hollywood after a lengthy location in Arizona. So I thought I had better pay a call on the film, which is being made in the new Todd AO process.
 On the set there was a ranch, complete with water tank and windmill. And at the other end of the stage, a farmhouse, with a backdrop that looked like a huge Grant Wood landscape. That's where all the activity was taking place.
 Director Fred Zinneman was in the center of the cast, directing the wedding of Curley and Laurie. This was strictly a rehearsal and the many young dancers were decked out in some of the wildest get-ups imaginable.
 "Now this is a movie," Zinneman was instructing the largely Broadway-trained group. "You will have to learn some of the things you have learned on the stage. Broad gestures will be out."
 He rehearsed the scene with the chorus and the principals, including Gordon Macrae, Shirley Jones, J. C. Flippen, Gloria Grahame, Charlotte Greenwood, Gene Nelson, James Whitmore. The wedding party streamed out of the house and went into a rousing chorus of "Oklahoma!"
 Oscar Hammerstein II is the film's overseer. Rodgers is having left for New York and his revival of "On Your Toes."
 "Yes, I have learned much from the picture," he commented. "This is the first time I have ever followed a picture through. I used to write them and let others carry the ball."
 "I've been on the set for almost every scene. One of the eyeopeners for me is the manpower involved in a picture. We might have a simple scene of a girl swimming in a lake. That would require 150 men behind the camera, and all

Fair manager, R. J. Christiansen today announced the final winners of the special prizes and awards made at the 1954 Modoc County Fair.
 The \$100 special prize awarded by Henderson Chevrolet of Alturas, for the 4-H Club or FFA Chapter winning the most points in the livestock classes was won by the Alturas chapter of the Future Farmers of America. This chapter is under the direction of Chris Starr. The Alturas group won by a scant 12 points over Bieber 4-H Club of Bieber under the direction of R. E. Bartel.
 Mitch and Babe of the Niles Hotel awarded \$25 for each the champion fat lamb and the champion feeder lamb of the junior show. These were both won by Will Hatfield of Alturas. Will is a member of the Alturas FFA chapter.
 The Lakeview chapter of the FFA was judged the most outstanding junior booth exhibit and received the \$35 special prize from Flournoy's Market, Jack and Carolyn Flournoy of Cedarville, California.

The \$25 special prize for the champion fat beef animal of the junior classes awarded by the Warner Hotel of Alturas was won by Johnny Husa of Cedarville with his calf scramble steer from the herd of Randall Collis of Alturas. Johnny was also the winner of the Rotary Club trophy for having the champion scramble calf of 1954.

The Modoc County Cooperative Association special prize of \$25 for the champion pen of five range ewe lambs was won by George Benner of Cedarville.
 In the open division the Eagle Grange of Eagleville was winner of the new trophy known as the Modoc County award, which is a rotating trophy awarded by the Modoc County supervisors for the booth most representative of Modoc County. This trophy must be won three times to retain permanent possession of it.

A. H. "Hippy" Burmister was the first winner of the new Modoc County Cattlemen's Association revolving trophy awarded annually for the champion pen of feeder steers. This trophy must be won three times for permanent possession.
