STOCKS

WALL STREET
NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market held fairly steady Thursday with a number of individual issues strong.

Traders exercised a high degree of selection in their buying and sent some issues up from 1 to 3 points. Most advances were fractional. Losses were light with some going to 2 points.

Trading was on the quiet side at an estimated 1,700,000 shares. That compares with 2,100,000 traded in Wednesday's lower market.

Neuberger, Hitchcock Debate Held

PORTLAND (AP) — Richard L. Neuberger, Democratic nominee for U. S. senator, who has been challenging Sen. Guy Cordon to debate him, got a debate Wednesday, but not with Cordon.

It was with former State Sen. Philip S. Hitchcock, who said he spoke for Cordon in the talks before the League of Women Voters Portland unit.

Neuberger referred several times to the fact that Cordon was not there in person to "explain to the people of Oregon his opposition to NATO and the great bipartisan program for mutual security in the Atlantic community... why he fought President Eisenhower to the bitter end on the isolationist Bricker Amendment" and why Cordon voted against the displaced persons program, Point IV and the reciprocal trade program.

Hitchcock said Neuberger was not meeting the campaign issues, but instead was using "psychological devices" to confuse the issues.

He said Neuberger's attacks on Cordon's records and statements that Cordon was taking part in a program to give away natural resources amounted to "muddling."

Hitchcock said this was "threat to our political way of life" and was the "overriding issue" of the campaign.

Neuberger repeated an offer to Cordon to limit campaign expenses and replied to a Cordon statement that Neuberger "already has spent \$23,000 on radio time alone."

The Democrat said he doubted that his campaign officials had contracted for that much radio time, and added, "If it's that much, I don't know how we'll pay for it. And if Cordon wants to limit campaign expenditures, all he has to do is accept my offer."

He reiterated that the Republicans consistently spent much more in Oregon campaigns than the Democrats, and said:

"I consider this one of the greatest problems of American politics today, and I promise you that the search for an effective limitation on campaign spending will be one of my first projects in the U. S. Senate."

CHICAGO (AP) — Soybeans fell sharply on the board of trade Thursday and rye was down almost as much. Feed grains eased but wheat maintained a firm tone.

September soybeans dropped 10 cents, the daily limit. Selling followed receipt of 155 cars of cash beans at Chicago. Rye fell on news West Germany had postponed contemplated purchase of cash rye.

Buying entered wheat on an official Canadian crop forecast sharply lowering estimated production, plus reports of frost in the Peace River Valley section. Wheat did not hold its best gains.

Prospect of a large quantity of poor quality Canadian wheat caused selling in feed grains. Such wheat can be brought into the United States for use as a livestock feed.

Steers were weak to 50 cents lower. Prime steers sold at 26.00. Good and choice moved from \$20.50 to \$25.50. Similar heifers brought \$19.00 to \$23.00.

Good to prime native spring lambs brought \$18.00 to \$20.50. Other salable receipts were estimated at 2,000 cattle, 300 calves, and 1,500 sheep.

Blood Drive Slogan Told

"Bring a Buddy." is the slogan adopted by the United Veterans who are working hard to break the state record for blood donation in a single day during the next visit of the Red Cross bloodmobile, September 22-23.

John Zumwalt, general chairman of the campaign for 800 pints of the lifesaving fluid, urges every man and woman who has given blood previously to tell a neighbor that it "doesn't hurt," and to help get that neighbor to the armory on one of the two days the truck is here.

The few moments, not more than 60, that it takes to contribute a pint of blood is a short time to give to saving a life. Zumwalt said today.

The entire operation from inspection of the deadening agent to withdrawal of the needle from the arm vein is painless. Few donors ever experience any after effects and then it usually is a faint tiredness which passes in a few hours.

Leo Jenkins, Klamath Falls resident, injured some time ago by a gunshot wound, credits Red Cross blood donations with saving his life. He received more than 20 pints during the critical stages of his recovery and said today, "I would not be alive had blood not been available."

This is only one instance Zumwalt said, where a local man, woman or child is alive and well because the Red Cross blood bank in Klamath Falls was stocked with blood when an emergency arose.

The truck will be at the armory, Wednesday, September 22, 4 to 8 p.m. and on Thursday, September 23, 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. and from 6 to 8 p.m.

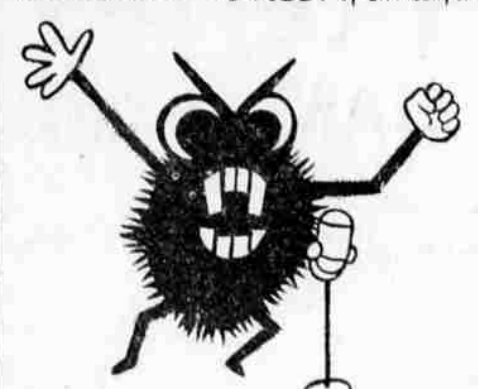
