School Rolls Show Increase

Major increases in enrollment in Klamath County schools centered in the high schools. It was revealed in a release today from the office of C. B. Howe, county school superintendent.

First grades in the 17 elementary buildings recorded about the same registration as last year. Increases were in Bonanza, Malin, Merrill, Chiloquin and Altamont. Weyerhaeuser Camp 4 school has been closed due to re-distribution of the crew.

Total enrollment, taken on September 10 was 4,699 compared with 4,613 last year. Students are continuing to enroll, Howe stated, and it is probable as of today, that the total has passed the 4,700 mark.

Registration at Henley, 585 is the largest in the county. Figures include both elementary and high school. Registrations at the other buildings follows: Bonanza, elementary, 229, high school 74; Peterson, elementary, 426; Fort Klamath elementary, 23; Keno, elementary, 100; Bly, elementary, 161, high school 146; Fairhaven elementary, 310; Shasta elementary, 206; Malin elementary, 267, high school, 118; Merrill, elementary, 299, high school, 94; Gilchrist elementary, 232, high school, 70.

Summers elementary, 113; Henley elementary, 398, high school 187; Chiloquin elementary 333, high school, 105; Sprague River elementary, 12; Altamont elementary, 301, junior high school, 473; Crescent Lake elementary 23.

September 10 date was used as it is a more stable figure than that of the first day of school and can be compared with Friday, September 11 last year.

High School Increase Told

CHILOQUIN — The upper four years at Chiloquin high school show the largest first week registration of any year since the late 1930's or 40's. Friday there were 105 students enrolled, 37 freshmen, 28 sophomores, 23 juniors and 15 seniors, each class showing a gain from last year with the exception of the senior class which had 17 last year, according to word received from the office of John Mathis, principal.

The seventh and eighth grade registration is down one student from last year. There were 38 in the seventh both years, 41 eighth graders last year and 40 this year. The grade school over the past four years has shown a steady first week growth. In 1951 there were 219; in 1952, 242 and in 1954 the number swelled to 255 in the lower six grades. Last year there were 54 first graders, 55 this year. In the second grade there were 41 last year and 53 now; third grade 37 and now 41.

The fourth grade shows a drop 35 and now 32, but there are indications several more may enroll later in the month. Thirty-six are enrolled in the 5th grade as against 33 last year and the sixth grade shows a drop from 41 to 38. Melvin Ray is the principal of the grade school.

Japan Premier To Visit U.S.

DENVER (AP) — The summer White House announced Wednesday Prime Minister Shigeru Yoshida of Japan will visit the United States in November. The Prime Minister is scheduled to leave Tokyo on Sept. 28 on an itinerary which will take him to Canada, France, West Germany, Italy, Great Britain and this country.

He will arrive in New York on Nov. 2 and will go to Washington Nov. 7 as the official guest of the U. S. government.

The Prime Minister will arrive in Vancouver, B. C. aboard a Canadian Pacific Airliner Sept. 28 on the first lap of his tour. There he will transfer to Canadian Prime Minister Louis St. Laurent's private plane for Ottawa.

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Lumber Club Holds Meeting

McCLOUD — The Southern Oregon - Northern California Seasoning Club met at McCLOUD last Friday. The morning was spent on a tour of the McCLOUD River Lumber Company mill and dry kilns followed by lunch at 1:30 p.m.

Ed Knight, afternoon speaker, talked on controlled drying, stressing the importance of segregation of lumber before drying and cited the example of Collins Pine Lumber at Chester which sorts fir into three classifications: sinkers, sap and heart, thereby saving time and retaining higher grades.

Next meeting of this club was set for November 13 at 9:30 a.m. at the Rogue River Box plant in Grants Pass. Plans were discussed for the joint club meeting to be held in Klamath Falls next April.

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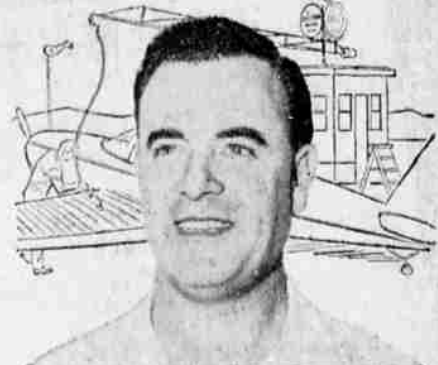


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
