

Millionaire Involved In Court Fray

PARIS (AP)—The reported kidnapping of the millionaire Antonio Patino's mother, a 4-month-old granddaughter, simmered down today to a custody fight between the wealthy Bolivian family and their British son-in-law.

The young father, 20-year-old hotel heir James Goldsmith, reported last night to police that his baby daughter Isabela had been kidnapped by an "unknown person or persons" from the Versailles hotel where she had been living with her grandmother.

The baby, Patino's lawyers announced today, "is somewhere in or near Paris with her grandmother," a Spanish Bourbon princess who has been estranged from Antonio Patino for years.

The lawyers said Mrs. Patino had asked the Paris Civil Court for custody of the child and the case would be argued tomorrow.

The attorneys refused to say just where Mrs. Patino and the baby were but added, "we can say they are together."

In filing his own charges in the civil court last night, Goldsmith dropped his kidnapping allegation and protested against "non-presentation of the child." He said he expected a thorough search to be made for the baby.

Court sources said after such a charge an investigation was routine. But they doubted any all-out hunt would result from what they said appeared to be essentially a family quarrel.

Goldsmith married Patino's 19-year-old daughter Isabela last January after a headline elopement to Scotland. Her parents joined in pursuit of them, but finally consented to the match.

The young couple's baby was delivered by caesarian operation last May 14 shortly after Isabela underwent complicated surgery for removal of a brain tumor. The mother died a few hours later and little Isabela lived in an incubator for two months.

Since then she had been cared for by an English nurse in the swank Trianon Palace Hotel, near the famous Chateau de Versailles, while Goldsmith was on a business trip to West Africa.

Goldsmith said the baby is suffering from anoxemia, a lack of oxygen in her blood, "caused by the unusual circumstances of her birth." He said she "may die if not properly cared for."

Patino's lawyers said Goldsmith and Mrs. Patino had quarreled on what sort of medical treatment she should be given.

Wet Weather Forecast

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS. More cloudy and wet weather appeared in prospect for wide areas of the country Thursday. There were heavy rainfalls in some parts of the southland in the last 24 hours.

Skies were mostly overcast in the northern Great Plains, the upper Mississippi Valley and the Great Lakes region. Skies also were cloudy in the east and extended from central New England to include Florida and the eastern shores of the Gulf of Mexico. Light rain fell in sections of the middle Atlantic states and southern New England.

Light rain also fell over most of Georgia and the Gulf areas. Rainfall in the last 24 hours measured nearly six inches at Savannah, Ga.; about 2 1/2 inches at Jacksonville, Fla.; three inches at Jacksonville, Fla., and Cape Hatteras, N. C., and nearly four inches at Burrhead, La.

There were thunderstorms in the central plains and light rain and thundershowers in the northern Rockies. Considerable cloudiness was reported in the Pacific Northwest with light rain in parts of western Oregon and northeastern Washington.

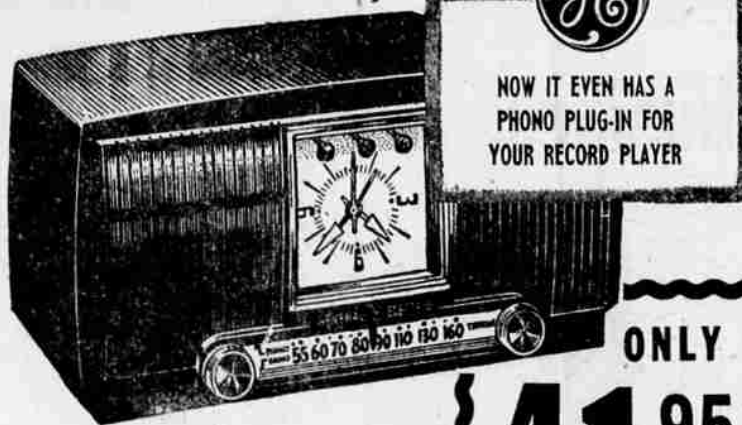
