WALL STREET
NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market opened with a strong upward trend Friday with many issues strong in the late afternoon. Gains of 1 to 4 points were registered by key stocks with most major divisions enjoying a good improvement in prices.

Red Chinese Bid In U.N. Expected

WASHINGTON (AP) — American officials are preparing for a one day, sudden death struggle over communist renewal next Tuesday of Red China's bid for U.N. membership.

The simple strategy, which has been effective in most of the 150 fruitless attempts by the Communists to unseat Chiang Kai-shek's Nationalist delegates, will be to avoid a showdown vote on the issue. Instead, the fight is planned on a move to defer action.

A quick settlement of the perennial question would clear the way for policy statements next week and thus free Secretary of State Dulles in plenty of time for the proposed meeting in late September of nine countries on the question of German sovereignty and rearmament.

Dulles, now visiting Europe to confer with German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer and British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden, has announced plans to attend the opening session Tuesday of the U.N. General Assembly, meeting at New York City. He will address the 60-nation assembly, probably Thursday.

America's new U.N. delegation, headed by Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge Jr., was called to the State Department today for swearing in exercises.

The five representatives and five alternates were briefed yesterday by State Department officials on what to expect. The usual attempt by Communist China to gain the seat now held by Nationalist China was forecast as the probable first clash between the free world and the Communists.

Red China's persistent attempts to win U.N. standing have resulted in 150 failures, counting committees of the U.N. Assembly as well as four times in vain at each of the past four fall sessions of the Assembly itself.

Members of this country's U.N. delegation, with Lodge as chairman, are Sens. H. Alexander Smith (R-N.J.) and J. William Fulbright (D-Ark.), C. D. Jackson of New York City and Charles H. Mahoney of Detroit.

Alternate representatives: James Phillip Nash of Austin, Tex.; Ade M. Johnson of Tacoma, Wash.; Roger W. Straus and Mrs. Oswald B. Lord, both of New York City, and career diplomat James J. Wadsworth, who is deputy to Lodge.

Ike Vacations In Rockies
FRASER, Colo. (AP) — The vacation recipe for the name for President Eisenhower Friday at his mountain retreat atop the continental divide.

But Presidential Press Secretary James C. Hagerty said the chief executive caught hazy a trout in several hours. The water in the creek is running at a near record low, Hagerty said.

Eisenhower and his party are staying in rustic log cabins on the ranch of Axel Nielsen, Denver business man. The President plans to return to Denver Sunday or Monday.

Fairly good export business and news of frost in Alberta and Saskatchewan, Canada, were behind the buying in wheat. The frost also was a factor in the strength of oats.

Selling in soybeans was concentrated in the September contract. Large receipts of cash beans, plus the belief receipts will be very heavy Monday, was the cause of the liquidation. Bean meal again was very weak.

Police Catch Two Thieves

Oregon State Police were called to the ranch of Joe Wright, south of the Municipal Airport, shortly after midnight this morning where Wright turned over two chicken thieves to them.

Carl May, a neighbor of Wright's, seeing a car parked on the road near his barn called Wright, who took his shotgun and went to investigate.

Turning on the lights in the barn Wright flushed out one thief carrying a sack containing four young pullets. Raising the shotgun he convinced Wright had no trouble in convincing Charlie Francis Clubb it would not be wise to run.

With Clubb carrying the chickens in the lead and Wright following, shotgun tucked under his arm, they proceeded to the parked car where Cecil Jefferson Worthington was waiting for the birds.

Clubb and Worthington were formally charged with larceny of poultry, a felony under Oregon law. They were arraigned before District Judge D. E. Van Vactor and waived preliminary hearing.

Judge Van Vactor ordered the two "chicken fanciers" held for the grand jury. In lieu of \$1,500 bail each, they were remanded to the county jail.

Deputy District Attorney Robert Kerr said the case would be presented to the grand jury before termination of its current investigation of crimes in Klamath County.
