## Cordon Notes Campaign Cost

**THE DALLES** — In a radio interview here today U. S. Senator Guy Cordon exploded what he calls the "campaign costs myth" and charged that his Democratic opponent already has spent \$23,000 on radio time alone.

"This is equivalent to the total expenses of my 1948 campaign," the Senator said.

Senator Cordon also noted that his 1948 campaign cost was "less than my colleague, the Independent Party, spent in the same contest." (This was an obvious reference to the \$41,000 spent on Wayne Morse's 1950 campaign as shown in the biennial report of the secretary of state for that year.)

In a reference to the \$211,000 figure which Senator Cordon's opponent has, by innuendo, said the Senator spent on his 1948 campaign, Senator Cordon pointed out that this was a total state Republican Central Committee campaign expenditure in a presidential election year. He then went on to say, "There was as much spent by Democrats that year whether they accounted for it or not."

The interview in The Dalles was recorded on tape for rebroadcast.

**PORTLAND** — A demand that the state stop fixing milk prices came from an Independence dairyman at a milk hearing here Thursday.

The dairyman, Joe Rogers, said the state Milk Marketing Administration apparently was unable to enforce its rules, and so should quit regulating prices.

He said some distributors were making loans and granting discounts to obtain retailer accounts, both in violation of state regulations.

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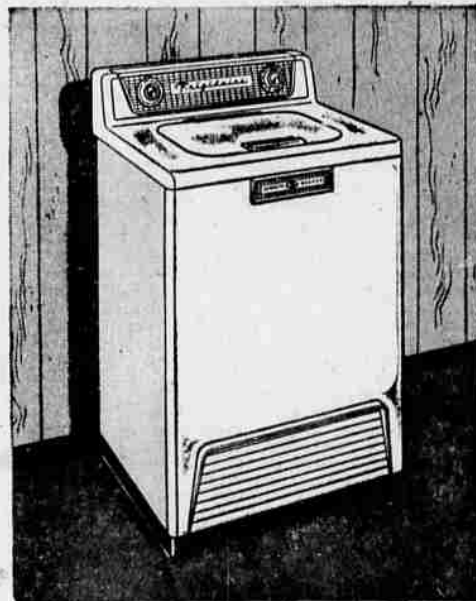
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
