

Neuberger Speaks Before League Of Women Voters

Efficient government, foreign policy and campaign spending were the election issues stressed by Richard J. Neuberger, candidate for United States senator, in a speech before the League of Women Voters in Portland Wednesday noon. Appearing as part of the League's pre-election program of presenting the candidates to the public, Neuberger struck hard at incumbent Senator Cordon's "dismal record of opposition and obstructionism" in roll-call votes against modernization of the federal executive departments, against the North Atlantic Pact, against the reciprocal trade program, Point IV, and the displaced persons program, and in favor of the "isolationist Bricker Amendment."

Pointing to Cordon's consistent votes against more than 20 reorganization plans of the type recommended by the Hoover Commission on governmental efficiency, Neuberger asked his opponent: "Why did you vote to continue the archaic system of political patronage appointments in the Post Office, in the Department of Justice and in the Treasury Department?"

Turning to foreign policy, Neuberger asked his audience to picture the state of the world and America's position in it if Cordon's votes against NATO, against the Mutual Security program, against aid to Asia, and for the Bricker Amendment had in fact been adopted as U. S. policy.

Neuberger went on to list votes by Senator Cordon against the foreign trade program, Point IV funds, and the displaced persons program, and assured the League that his position is diametrically opposed to Cordon's on each of these issues. Citing the overwhelming bi-partisan support for the Atlantic program, the importance of the other foreign programs, and President Eisenhower's determined fight to defeat the Bricker Amendment, Neuberger challenged his opponent to "explain to the people of Oregon his opposition to NATO and the great bipartisan program for mutual security in the Atlantic community, as well as his opposition to the humane displaced persons program, and why he fought President Eisenhower to the bitter end on the isolationist Bricker Amendment?"

Neuberger told his audience that in the last three elections in Oregon, the Republican party and its candidates have spent \$1,315,734 while the Democrats have spent only \$285,033. Pointing to this difference, Neuberger asked "who makes available such tremendous political slush funds and why," saying that "spending on such a scale drowns intelligent discussion of the issues in a blizzard of billboards and ballyhoo." Neuberger renewed an offer he has made earlier to agree to a ceiling of \$25,000 for both candidates and another \$25,000 for both parties.

Referring to a recent resolution against big campaign spending by the Oregon Council of Churches, Neuberger said: "I consider this one of the greatest problems of American politics today, and I promise you that the search for an effective limitation on campaign spending will be one of my first projects in the United States Senate."

Air Colonel Faces Court

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Air Force Wednesday brought court-martial charges against Col. Robert Orr, much decorated veteran of World War II and Korea who was arrested on a burglary charge in Las Vegas, Nev., July 2.

Orr has been transferred from Walter Reed Hospital, where he has been under investigation and observation since Aug. 25 to confinement at Bolling Air Force Base pending action on the move against him.

He is accused of violating security regulations, unlawful entry, fraudulent claims against the government.

Orr, 36, was arrested by civil authorities in Nevada after he was found to have a number of watches, a set of burglary tools and keys to hotel rooms around the country. He was later turned over to the Air Force, which flew him to the hospital here for psychiatric observation and investigation of his off-duty activities.

Orr's last assignment was as administrative assistant to the vice chief of staff of the Air Force in Washington.

An Air Force spokesman said that the security violations charge involved a failure to safeguard classified documents. There was no immediate explanation for the charge of fraudulent claims.

Orr was born in Pittsburgh, Pa., and now resides in Arlington, Va.

Atomic Plant Strike Ended

WAVERTY, Ohio (AP) — About 18,000 AFL construction workers returned to work Thursday, ending a strike that has tied up work at the huge Portsmouth area atomic energy plant since last Friday.

By Monday the plant will be in full operation, said Federal Mediator George Bell.

There was considerable confusion about what actually caused the strike, which union spokesmen said was unauthorized. Union and company officials appeared reluctant to talk about it.

But Guy Morrison, international representative of the AFL Ironworkers, said the strike was the result of a misunderstanding. Construction work was being turned over too soon to the Goodyear Atomic Corp., which will operate the plant for the Atomic Energy Commission. Thus, he said, construction work was being handled by production workers.

That error has been cleared up, he said after a meeting with company officials and the federal mediator Wednesday night.

Adlai Blasts Republican Record In Campaign Talk

CINCINNATI (AP) — Democrat Adlai Stevenson last night called for an "agonizing reappraisal" in the hearts of Republican politicians "who for so long nourished us on myths and McCarthyism."

"One of the myths and distortions that has been carefully cultivated for a long time is that the Democratic party is anti-business," he told a Democratic campaign dinner.

The 1952 presidential candidate said the Republican "hatchet men" will conduct the smear attacks on the flanks" while President Eisenhower delivers "little sermonettes."

But he said the election this week of a Democratic governor in Maine for the first time in 20 years confirms that "our people are tired of this unending diet of equal portions of niceness, nonsense and nastiness."

Stevenson devoted a substantial part of his address to business and how he said it prospered under Democratic presidents.

"For every three business enterprises existing in this country when the Democrats took office in 1933, there were four by 1953," he said. "The rate of business failures during the so-called Golden 20s was 20,000 a year. But that figure dropped to only 6,000 a year even during the hard post-World War II period of adjustment from war to peace to defense mobilization."

"Corporation profits after taxes were more than twice as high in 1952 as in the Republican peak year of 1929."

He said both the Democratic party and the business community want "vigorous, stimulating competition in a growing economy."

"And I hope that hard-headed businessmen will take some hard looks at the record at those old slogans about Democratic 'left-wingers,'" he remarked. "Maybe
