He will be one of a panel of four who will present papers on the design and construction of

Committee on Recreation Administration, a committee of the National Recreation Administration, Chairman of the committee is George Hjelte, head of parks and recreation in Los Angeles and one of the top men in the field.

The local park and recreation head will attend congress sessions on youth sports, new methods and short cuts in development and maintenance, sports clinics. He will urge proper placement of girls' athletics in national competition.

In addition, he will submit for criticism and suggests a proposed constitution and laws for an organization to coordinate recreation and parks in Oregon. Highway Bids To Be Awarded

The Oregon State Highway Commission will receive bids on September 23, for paving work on the Lenx Road - Kirk Road north of the Mazama Junction - Lobst section a distance of 14 miles.

The project calls for 12 feet of black top pavement to provide a more stable all-weather roadway. The shoulders are to be filled to a width of four feet from either pavement edge to assist in the protection of the pavement edges from breaking down due to infiltration of water.

Completion of this project, scheduled for June 31, 1955, will provide a continuous Jack top pavement from a point about five miles south of Mazama Junction to Lobert, a distance of 31 miles.
