WSSC Meeting

FORT KLAMATH — For their regular monthly meeting, members of the Women's Society of Christian Service of the Fort Klamath Community Methodist Church met Thursday, September 8, at the home of Mrs. Frank Hansen, Neptune Park.

The Hansen living room was decorated with arrangements of lovely fall blooms. Meeting was conducted by president, Mrs. Raymond S. Loosley.

Members voted to help the local Sunday School in its project of adopting a Korean orphan child for one year; \$10.00 a month will be contributed, and anyone in the community wishing to help may contact Sunday School workers or members of the Women's Society. It was also decided that the sum of \$25.00 would be given toward the expense entailed in re-roofing the Methodist parsonage at Chiloquin. Resident minister, the Rev. Edmund Stanton, serves churches of both Chiloquin and Fort Klamath.

It was announced that Mrs. W. J. (Barney) Cox, in collaboration with Mrs. Loosley and Mrs. Hansford T. (Mike) Williams, had completed the task of compiling and mailing a scrapbook on the Oregon Town and Country Church Improvement Project, and annual contest in which the Fort Klamath Community Methodist Church has entered for the third consecutive year. Sponsored by the Oregon Council of Churches, cash awards are furnished through the cooperation of the Sears, Roebuck Foundation. The contest covers all improvements made between July 1, 1953 and September 15, 1954. Points are scored for improvements in buildings, grounds and the program of service to church and community. In 1952, a certificate of recognition of merit was given the local church for its efforts; in 1953 a cash award of \$75.00 was won. Later this fall, the Town and Country Church Conference will be held at Corvallis, when cash awards and certificates will be awarded.
