## Full German Arms Equality Problems Studied By U.S.

WASHINGTON (AP)—The proposal to make West Germany a full-fledged member of the European defense system raises the problem of how much atomic weapons information the United States would then give her.

France is reported to want definite controls set for re-creation of a German armed force if West Germany should be taken in as a member of the 14-nation North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

## Micro-Wave Towers Tested

Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Co. is installing a micro-wave testing tower on "K" hill, just off Pacific Terrace.

The tower is one of several which are being installed as part of a preliminary study on the possibility of a radio relay route between Chico, California, and Portland, Ore. The route is being surveyed to approximately parallel the coaxial cable through Medford, Roseburg and Eugene.

Such a route will be established in not decided yet; nor is the location of transmitters definite, according to Stuart Bowie, manager of Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Co.

Another testing tower such as the one on "K" hill is planned for Buck Mountain; both to be equipped with radio relay equipment.

The micro-wave testing tower is of the line of sight type — in which the sending and receiving stations are in the line of sight. Roughly, towers are located 30 to 40 miles apart on a route. Messages are received and amplified and sent to the next tower automatically by equipment in the tower.

Bowie said the company has numerous other towers like this in operation in other parts of the country, which are equipped to handle several telephone channels or one television channel on a beam.

## Nixon Denies Accusations

MINNEAPOLIS (AP)—Vice President Nixon yesterday denied Adlai Stevenson's charges that the Republican administration is a "give-away government" and is responsible for "an alarming deterioration of our world position." Nixon challenged the unsuccessful Democratic candidate for President in 1952 to make known his own position on world issues.

The vice president told a news conference Stevenson has made no constructive suggestions of his own on world issues, such as Indochina and Korea. "The people are entitled to know what Stevenson's actions would have been in these cases," Nixon said.

Nixon, on an eight-state speaking tour on behalf of Republican candidates for Congress, attended services yesterday in the church of a former college friend.

He spoke briefly from the pulpit of the Rev. Ezra Ellis in the Wesley Methodist Church and was presented a red leather bible. Mr. Ellis was a fellow student at Whittier College, Whittier, Calif.

At his news conference, Nixon referred to the recent Maine election in which Edmund S. Muskie was elected the first Democratic governor of the state in 20 years and said the voting there was not particularly significant.

## School Children Given Polio Shots

ROCK ISLAND, Ill. (AP)—In an attempt to halt the march of polio, some 10,000 Rock Island school children yesterday were inoculated with gamma globulin, the nation's largest mass inoculation this year.

So far this year, 37 polio cases have been reported in the city and another 41 in Rock Island County. In 1953 there were 14 city cases and 7 county cases reported.

Eisenhower had intended originally to end his visit here yesterday afternoon, but switched plans and decided to stay in Fraser overnight.

James C. Hagerty, White House secretary, reported the chief executive feeling fine and said he had "unwound a great deal" since he arrived last Wednesday at the ranch of an old friend, Aksel Nielsen.

"He has had the best rest he has had in a long, long time," Hagerty added.
