**Eugene To Host Music Educators**  
 Andrew Loney Jr., director of music in the Klamath Falls public schools, has returned from a planning meeting held in Eugene last Saturday, to work out organizational plans and program for the bi-annual Music Educators National Association Convention (Northwest division) to be held in Eugene next spring. Loney is a past president of this organization and the past presidents, together with the present state officers from Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana, Wyoming, Northern Utah, and Alaska were present. Music educators from these states will spend four days, April 12-16, in Eugene attending workshops, demonstrations, and clinics conducted by nationally known specialists in their respective fields. Superintendent Clarence Hines of the Eugene schools is dismissing the high school for three days so the sectional meetings can be held in the new Eugene High School.  
 One of the highlights of these conventions has always been the All Northwest Band, Orchestra, and Chorus. These students are selected on the basis of character and musical ability upon the recommendation of principals and music directors of the various schools, and are outstanding students in their respective schools. The committees in charge of selection are obliged to accept one student, at least, from each school sending in applications. The chorus will be directed by Dr. Charles Hirt, of Los Angeles, and will consist of 400 students. 300 students will comprise the band which will be conducted by Dr. Harold Bachman, of the famous "Bachman's Million Dollar Band," and the orchestra by Dr. Leo Hoffman, internationally known young orchestra conductor of the Vancouver, British Columbia Symphony. These students will come together under these nationally known conductors and their work will be climaxed by a concert in McArthur Court, Saturday night, April 16. In addition to the All Northwest music organizations, many individual bands, orchestras, choirs, glee clubs, and ensembles will be invited to appear at the


