

# Democrats Pick Harriman Over FDR, Jr. in New York

NEW YORK (AP)—Averell Harriman was nominated for governor by the Democratic party early today and he began immediately to map out plans for a vigorous campaign.

The wealthy 62-year-old former Republican who became a top official of the Roosevelt and Truman administrations, easily defeated Rep. Franklin D. Roosevelt Jr. on the first ballot after one of the most acrimonious state conventions in the history of the party.

The remainder of the ticket was to be selected today, and the two-day convention will close tonight with a formal acceptance speech by Harriman.

The Republican state convention is expected to nominate U.S. Sen. Irving M. Ives for governor tomorrow. John A. Ulinsky, Buffalo parks commissioner, was reported holding the inside track for the Democratic nomination for lieutenant governor.

Roosevelt conceded defeat shortly after 1 a. m. when Harriman had rolled up 541 votes to the congressman's 217. A majority of 510 was needed.

Onondaga County's 22 votes put Harriman over the top, 531 to 213. At that point in the rollcall, Roosevelt strode to the platform. He had been in an anteroom of the convention hall—the 165th Regiment Armory—with his wife and mother, Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt, widow of President Roosevelt.

Before Roosevelt could be presented, two more county delegations had voted to bring the total to 541-217.

Paul E. Fitzpatrick, the convention's permanent chairman, halted the rollcall and presented Roosevelt as "a great American."

FDR, told the wildly cheering delegates:

"On behalf of my many friends, I would like to suggest that the nomination of my old friend Averell Harriman be made unanimous."

Referring to the bitter battle for the nomination, Roosevelt said, "let bygones be bygones" and promised to campaign for Harriman. He predicted that if the Democrats went all out in the campaign they would win their first New York gubernatorial victory "in 12 long, horrible years."

Harriman appeared on the platform and Roosevelt congratulated him. He also congratulated Tammany leader Carmine G. DeSapio one of the party leaders who led the fight for Harriman.

Harriman, with Roosevelt at his side, thanked the delegates for their "expression of confidence" and Roosevelt for his pledge of support.

The harmonious scene contrasted sharply with the angry battle the Roosevelt and Harriman forces had fought for the nomination.

The struggle, in progress since a Tammany coalition with more than enough votes to dictate the choice of the nominee had come out for Harriman early this month, reached a brilliant climax on the convention floor.

Delegates backing Roosevelt, most of them from upstate, stayed a 55-minute demonstration after the congressman's name had been placed in nomination by Assemblyman James J. McGuinness of Albany.

Carrying pictures of Roosevelt and the standards of about 30 counties, some of which were divided in allegiance between the two candidates, delegates and others paraded through the aisles.

Leo Quinn, an aide of Daniel P. O'Connell, Albany Democratic leader, finally went to the platform and called for an end of the demonstration. McGuinness and Fitzpatrick pleaded with the marchers to take their seats, but they had difficulty persuading them.

McGuinness had touched off the demonstration with a nominating speech in which he demanded an "open" convention and said, "if the whip is to be taken off your backs, take it off now."

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# Dave Beck Defends Use Of Funds

LOS ANGELES (AP)—AFL Teamsters Union President Dave Beck said today in advance of the opening of a new congressional probe into union handling of rich welfare funds he would be "surprised" if investigators found anything wrong.

Beck, a number of whose local union officials have been summoned as committee witnesses, said he "would bet" no wrongdoing could be attributed to his union.

The investigation was launched by a special House subcommittee headed by Rep. Samuel K. McConnell Jr. (R-Pa.), chairman of the House Labor Committee, while the American Federation of Labor was holding its annual convention sessions in the same city.

Today's hearings were the start of twin probes by House and Senate committees into the multi-billion-dollar union benefits plans.

Prior investigations have brought out that union officials have profited from investing and handling the funds, much of the testimony centering around Beck's Teamsters union.

Beck, however, told reporters he considered none of the previous investigations have produced evidence of racketeering on the part of Teamsters union officers.

While claiming lack of any evidence of fraud, Beck at the same time called for changing the Teamsters union constitution to give him more authority to safeguard the funds now controlled by local and area union groups.

This has been successfully resisted by Teamster union local officials in the past, through reluctance to surrender say-so over the member benefit money. A constitutional change could not be considered until the next Teamsters convention in 1957, and Beck conceded that he hesitated to call a special convention to consider it now.

AFL President George Meany has pledged the AFL's full cooperation with congressional probes and has called for a union cleanup

EASTHAMPTON, Mass. (AP)—Edward Hanlon, 77, stepped from a curb three years ago and fractured his right hip.

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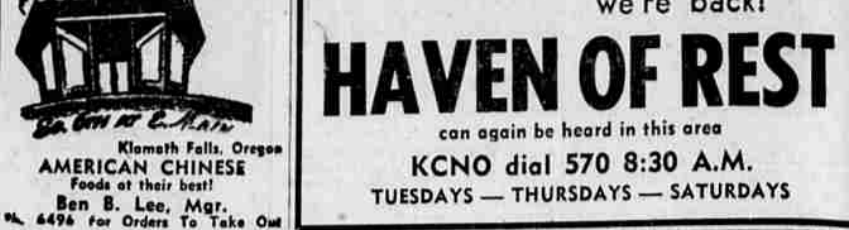
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
