Crash Blamed On High Speed

Excessive speed was blamed for a car-train crash on Altamont Drive that sent two young people to the Klamath Valley Hospital shortly before midnight last night.

George Dale Childers, 23, 405 North Second and Ann Wolftrum, 18, 4305 Altamont Drive, were believed out of danger this morning, according to the attending physician. Childers suffered a broken rib and injuries to his left wrist, and his passenger received severe head lacerations, shock and possible skull fracture.

The wrecked car was traveling north on Altamont Drive and crashed into a Great Northern freight train at the crossing just north of the airport.

State police stated the car skidded for a distance of 155 feet, 7 inches before the crash occurred. Childers had been issued a citation for running two stop signs and warned about speeding less than an hour before the accident, officers reported.

KASRU Fly-In Hunt Planned

Klamath Air Search and Rescue Unit is making plans for its next event—a fly-in deer hunt—to be held October 10. Ben Burgess, program chairman, said this morning. The hunt will be held from Pinehurst air strip, located between Klamath Falls and Ashland.

The unit has expressed appreciation to committee members and others who contributed to make the fly-in barbecue last Sunday a success. Approximately 45 planes and more than 250 people from as far south as Downing, California, were present for the barbecue at the local air field.

Oregon Bond Sales Reported

The people of Oregon made another spectacular purchase of U.S. Treasury Department E and H Savings Bonds during August, according to E. C. Sammons, chairman of the State Savings Bonds Committee. Portland, who released sales figures for last month today.

Klamath County's sales were down nearly \$50,000 at the end of August, compared with the same date last year, although the state's total showed a jump of over a million dollars for August, 1954, over August, 1953. The increase amounted to 47 per cent and was achieved in the face of the lumber industry strike, Sammons commented.

World Traveler Speaks To KF Knife And Fork Club

An eloquent world traveler who hobnobbed with Winston Churchill and Menckel-France and refers to Clement Attlee as "a sheep in sheep's clothing," addressed the Knife and Fork Club Wednesday night in the Willard Hotel.

The speaker was Robert Kazmayer, one of the most popular orators on the after dinner talk circuit, who indicated he would feel just as much at home in the Taj Mahal as the Klamath County Courthouse.

Kazmayer just returned a few days ago from Europe where he witnessed the demise of the Euro-

pean Defense Community. He evidenced little faith in France to solve its problems and contends that Germany is the country to watch.

"I was in Berlin when World War II ended," he said. "There was no question but what Germany was beaten and its economy wrecked. I saw German industrialists who didn't have a single asset left."

"I was back in Germany a short time ago," he continued. "Those impoverished industrialists of a few years ago are now riding around in yachts. Since the war, Germany's industrial production has risen to 178 per cent of Hitler's top figure in 1938."

Kazmayer also said that the Germans are not favorably inclined towards the United States, particularly America's occupation forces. "We must remember," he added, "that German unity is first in the minds of the German people. They will trade with Soviet Russia because Russia holds East Germany and might be induced to give it back. I believe Germany will go with which ever side offers it the most."

The lecturer also said he believes as an aftermath of the collapse of EDC, Germany will be reformed and given its sovereignty. "As I said before, Germany then will deal with Russia in the hope of getting back East Germany."

Kazmayer also said he believes Russia is still perpetrating the greatest bluff in history. "When you analyze the situation," he pointed out, "the only real aggression Russia has carried out was in Finland. All the other countries she has occupied were taken over with what amounted to the consent of the United States and the other big powers."

"I do not believe Russia will push the world into war. Russia will do everything short of starting another global conflict. Russia, in my notion, is staging the world's greatest bluff and getting away with it."

Kazmayer was presented to the audience of more than 300 persons by Lee Hendricks, Dr. Marvin Nereth, president of the Knife and Fork Club, acted as toastmaster. The program was arranged by Fred Southwell, secretary of the club.

His reasons: He isn't a registered Republican, and besides he is supporting the Democratic candidate for mayor.

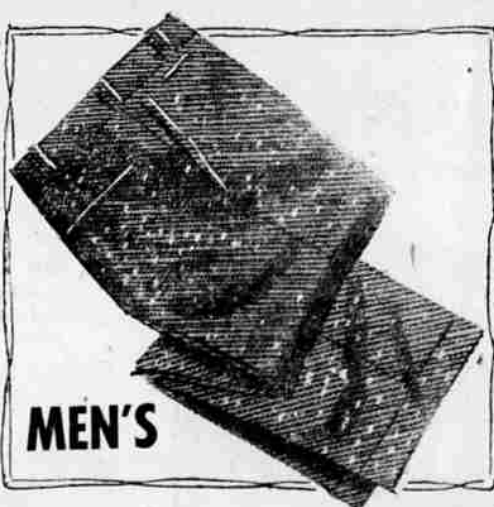
