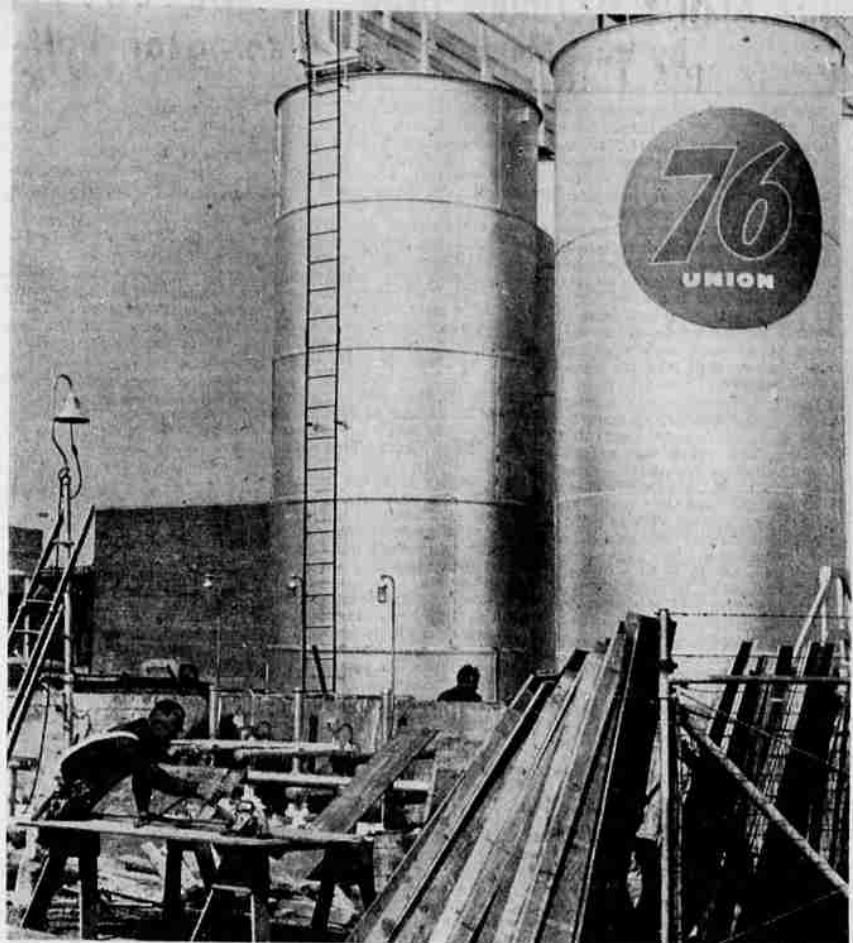

New Union Oil Plant Started

Work has been started on a new Union Oil plant at the corner of Market and South Sixth Streets that will replace the present one, built about 1917. Union Oil products, principally kerosene, were delivered in horse drawn rigs when the business was first opened.

C. H. Turner, Portland, construction foreman said today, the new buildings will be of concrete blocks and steel. Plans call for a warehouse, 40 by 88 feet; a garage, 32 by 36 and an office, fronting on South Sixth, 16 by 22 feet. Storage capacity of the two large tanks is 120,000 gallons. Union Oil has only one distribution plant in a city. The plant here serves Poe Valley, Dairy, Klamath Falls, Keno, Dorris and Butte Valley. Other distribution centers are located at Merrill and Bonanza.

Work is being done by the Brosthouse Construction Company and the Siles Plumbing Company. Construction should be completed in two months.

OTI Rifle Range To Be Opened

For the convenience of those who avail themselves of the campus rifle range facilities, the gunsmithing class will have a food booth that will be operating both days. Coffee, soft drinks and hot dogs will be sold.

Missouri Prison Riot Probe Slated

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo. (AP) — Missouri prison officials today concentrated on rehabilitation problems growing out of the convict riot that virtually wiped out the state penitentiary industries. They also sought ringleaders in the 15-hour rebellion. When the revolt finally ended early yesterday four convicts were dead, 30 others and three guards were injured. Damage to the pen-

itentiary was estimated at three to five million dollars.

Three of the injured prisoners remained in critical condition.

Thomas E. Whitecotton, director of corrections, said he planned to make a thorough investigation be-

fore taking any disciplinary action.

He said he felt the ringleaders comprised a small group in the maximum security section where the rioting started.

Some prisoners claimed it result-

ed from pent-up resentment over food. Other prisoners and officials said they believed the riot was without purpose — instigated by unstable convicts and carried out by men who were victims of mass hysteria.

Whitecotton said the immediate

concern of penal authorities was:

1. To get the penitentiary back to a near normal operating basis.
2. To attempt to solve the problem of carrying on until the next state legislative session can do something about reconstructing the wrecked buildings.

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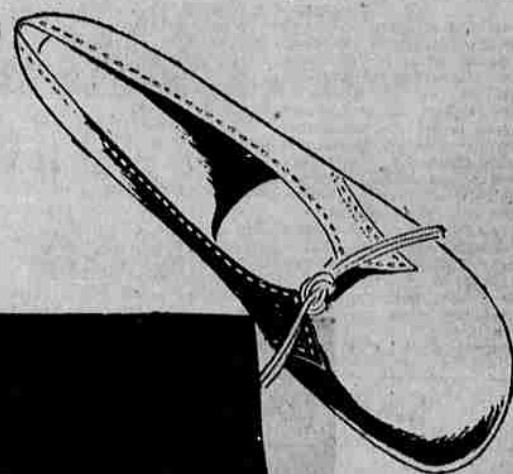
