Malin Council Holds Meeting

MALIN — At the regular monthly meeting of the Malin City Council an amendment was passed and adopted by the council and will be submitted to the qualified electors of the city of Malin for its approval or rejection at a special election to be held November 2, 1954, between the hours of 8 a.m. and 8 p.m.

The amendment reads: The elective officers of said city shall be a mayor, treasurer, recorder and six aldermen. The mayor, treasurer and recorder who take office January 1, 1955, shall hold the respective office for a term of four years, and thereafter their successors shall be elected for a term of four years. That of the six aldermen who take office January 1, 1955, the three receiving the largest number of votes at the election November 2, 1954, shall hold office for a term of four years and the three receiving the smallest number of votes hold office for a term of two years; thereafter all councilmen shall be elected for terms of four years.

Candidates desiring to run for any of the city officers should have their petitions in by September 30, according to Mayor Louis Kalina. Petitions should be filed with city recorder Charles Hamilton by that date.
