### Los Angeles Hit By Smog Clouds

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Los Angeles citizens faced another smoggy time today after an attack of the eye-irritating stuff yesterday was termed the worst of the year.  
 One superior judge adjourned his court in the Civic Center yesterday because of the discomfort, and citizens were coughing and wiping their eyes most of the day. The smog clouds rolled in early and then spread to foothill communities.  
 Smog and fog cut visibility at the Los Angeles International Airport and no planes were allowed to land until 11 a.m.

### Nation's Factories Call Laid-Off Workers Back

NEW YORK (AP)—Business produced a tempting package of cheerful news this week for factory workers, investors and consumers.  
 Best news for the laboring man was word that factories here and there were starting to call back laid-off help.  
 Investors could derive encouragement from the continued strength of the stock market, where averages punched again and again to new 25-year highs.  
 Consumers had assurance that living costs were going down, and that bargains should be plentiful at Christmas shopping time.  
 The boom in home building continued to baffle the experts — government statisticians said new housing starts in August were 19 per cent ahead of a year ago. Builders said the fast pace would continue.

The calendar contributed a psychological lift: It was the first week of autumn. But on the debit side, there were few if any tangible signs of a surging autumn business upturn.  
 Still in the midst of changing over to production of 1955 models, the auto industry cut its weekly output of passenger cars to about 50,000, lowest since the steel strike of 1952.  
 General Electric Co. hung out the help wanted sign for 2,000 additional employees at its big "appliance park" in Louisville, Ky. The reason: Increased demand for household refrigerators.  
 Amann Refrigeration Inc. announced a 17 per cent increase in its working force at its home freezer plant in Amama, Ia.  
 Pittsburgh Steel Co. started round-the-clock operation of its new cold rolled sheet mill in Allegheny, Pa., citing a "substantial" increase in new orders.  
 Retail merchants set their sights on a banner Christmas season volume achieved last year.  
 A majority of merchants polled by the National Retail Dry Goods Assn. said they hoped to equal or better the record Christmas volume achieved last year.  
 Latest government figures showed living costs on the down-trend again after a three-month rise. The Bureau of Labor Statistics said its consumer price index declined 0.2 per cent last month to 115 per cent of the 1947-49 average. That's exactly where it was a year ago.

### Clark Gable Goes To Hospital

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Clark Gable, the 53-year-old movie idol, is in wind up to 110 miles an hour, Cedars of Lebanon Hospital today for a routine checkup, attendants said.  
 A hospital spokesman said Gable holds the opinion that the way to remain in good health is to have periodic checkups.

### EXPLOSION

LISBON, Portugal (AP)—An explosion aboard the 5,000-ton Panamanian ship African Saturday killed one person and wounded several others. Lisbon port authorities announced.

### Nationalist Air Force Hits Reds

TAIPEH, Formosa (AP)—Chiang Kai-Shek's navy and air force teamed up Saturday for the 23rd consecutive day of attacks on the Red China coast opposite Formosa, the Defense Ministry announced.  
 A communiqué reported only sporadic gunfire between Chinese Nationalist batteries on Quemoy and Red batteries on the mainland seven miles away.  
 A military spokesman here said Saturday the 30,000 man Quemoy garrison is far better prepared now to meet attack than when the fighting started Sept. 2.  
 Supplies have been flowing onto the island in a steady stream, he said, and so far there has been no attempt by the Communists to interfere.

### TYPHOON

TOKYO (AP)—The latest Pacific typhoon brushed the island fortress of Okinawa Saturday and whirled toward Japan. Air Force weathermen said gusts of wind up to 110 miles an hour, were recorded on the island.

## AFL Union Drive Against John L. Lewis Reported

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Several top AFL unions today were reported banded together for an organizing drive to take away members from John L. Lewis' United Mine Workers (UMW).  
 The AFL Teamsters, Carpenters, Laborers and Operating Engineers Unions were reported to have established a joint fund to try to squeeze Lewis out of the construction field.  
 The drive may cause a realignment among labor's top leaders. Lewis recently has been meeting with AFL Teamsters' President Dave Beck and CIO steelworkers President David McDonald in an alliance which has been critical of both the AFL and CIO.  
 The four unions were reported to have decided to try to take over workers represented by Lewis' UMW District 50 in the highway and heavy construction field with hopes of taking over UMW building workers later on.  
 The agreement of the four AFL unions for a drive against Lewis' members, particularly in the coal fields, came during sessions of the annual AFL convention here but was not formally announced.  
 The convention recessed for the weekend but delegates, whose sessions will resume Monday, were still talking about the address made yesterday by President Eisenhower.  
 Eisenhower renewed his pledge to remove "union-busting" provisions from the Taft-Hartley law. But delegates thought the address did not agree with his policies.  
 James L. McDavitt, director of the AFL's Labor League for Political Education, said in a convention speech the League is supporting 205 candidates for House seats and 25 for Senate seats in this fall's congressional elections.  
 Without identifying congressional candidates the AFL is supporting, McDavitt said they include a "some Republicans" and added that he felt "encouraged" that a Congress friendly to labor would be elected.  
 The convention approved a resolution saying that while the AFL's immediate goal is to get Congress to reduce the present 40-hour work

week to a 25-hour week within the next two years, its long-term aim is a 30-hour week with premium pay for extra hours.  
 The resolution said that a shorter work week is necessary to keep a growing population employed while industrial mechanization is constantly permitting more production with less man-power.
