Defenbacher, Director, California College of Arts and Crafts, Oakland; Alexander Fried, art critic, S. F. Examiner; Thomas Carr Howe Jr., Director, Palace of the Legion of Honor; Maurice Logan, Oakland artist, member of the National Academy; Glen Wessels, artist, Professor of Art, University of California.

Gold, silver and bronze medals will be awarded, as well as a guest of honor one-man show and \$350 in Adele Hyde Morrison purchase awards.

### Crater Lake Bids Asked

Formal invitation for bids will be issued by Crater Lake National Park on or about October 29 for the construction of a shop and equipment building.

Normally, no work can be undertaken at the site between October 15 and June 1, due to heavy snowfall. The park service will, however, plan to remove snow from the site as early in the spring as practicable.

Project No. 1-B consists of shop and equipment building, one story, steel framed, concrete block structure, approximately 46x103 feet, with concrete slab roof and floor, steel window sash and certain fixed automotive repair equipment.

Plans and specifications have minor changes to be made before issue, but may be examined by prospective bidders at the following addresses:
