

Klamath Hosts Hi-Y Meeting

Approximately 60 leaders and officers of Hi-Y and Tri-Hi-Y Clubs in Ashland, Medford, Grants Pass and Klamath Falls met at the local YMCA Sunday for the annual Southern District Leadership Institute.

Delegates were welcomed by the registrants, Pat Wilbanks, Susan O'Hair, Janet Wimer and Gracie Lou Henry. During the opening session an outstanding devotion was conducted by the Ashland group. A talk on "Character" showed what is the effect of a good Hi-Y or Tri-Hi-Y member in his group and his community. This set the tone for deep thinking throughout the institute.

Ideas and problems of the several clubs represented were shared in the workshops. At noon, the senior Tri-Hi-Y Club served luncheon, under the guidance of Mrs. Sverre Munson and Mrs. Lloyd Porter.

James Mummary, associate executive secretary of the Pacific Northwest Area Council of YMCAs, reported on the Seventh National Hi-Y Tri-Hi-Y Conference held in the East last July. He briefly described the Paris Conference, to be held next August, and emphasized the worldwide fellowship which will be represented by the some 2,000 Hi-Y and Tri-Hi-Y members from some 78 countries in which YMCA is active.

Lowell Coutant, Grants Pass, was elected to succeed Wes Sine as president of the Southern District Council. Other officers are Doug McGregory, vice president; Nancy Zuvach, secretary; treasurer, both of Grants Pass.

Coutant issued an invitation to the council to hold next year's institute at Grants Pass. He conducted the closing business session, in which it was voted to increase next year's registration fee from 25 cents to 35 cents to subsidize three area representatives to the national Hi-Y Tri-Hi-Y council in the East.

dinner sponsored by the youth of the congregation with Mrs. Bob Johnson in charge.

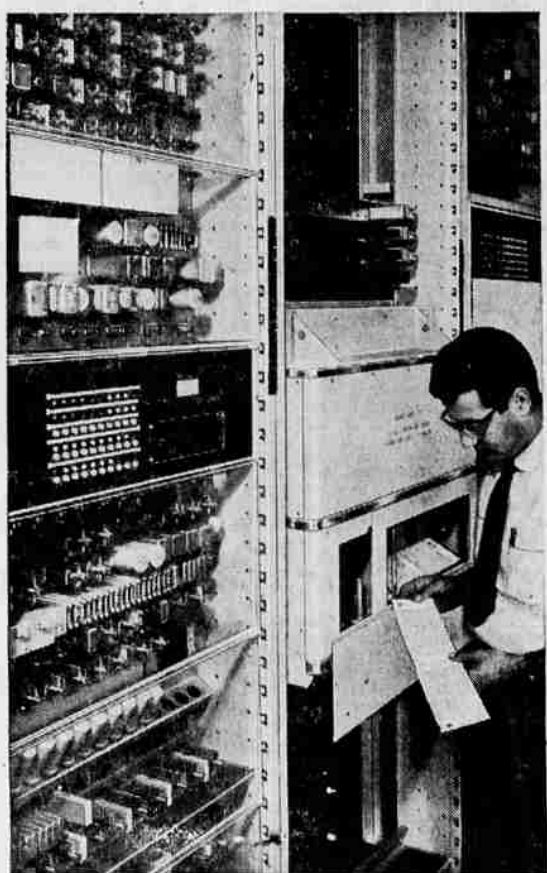

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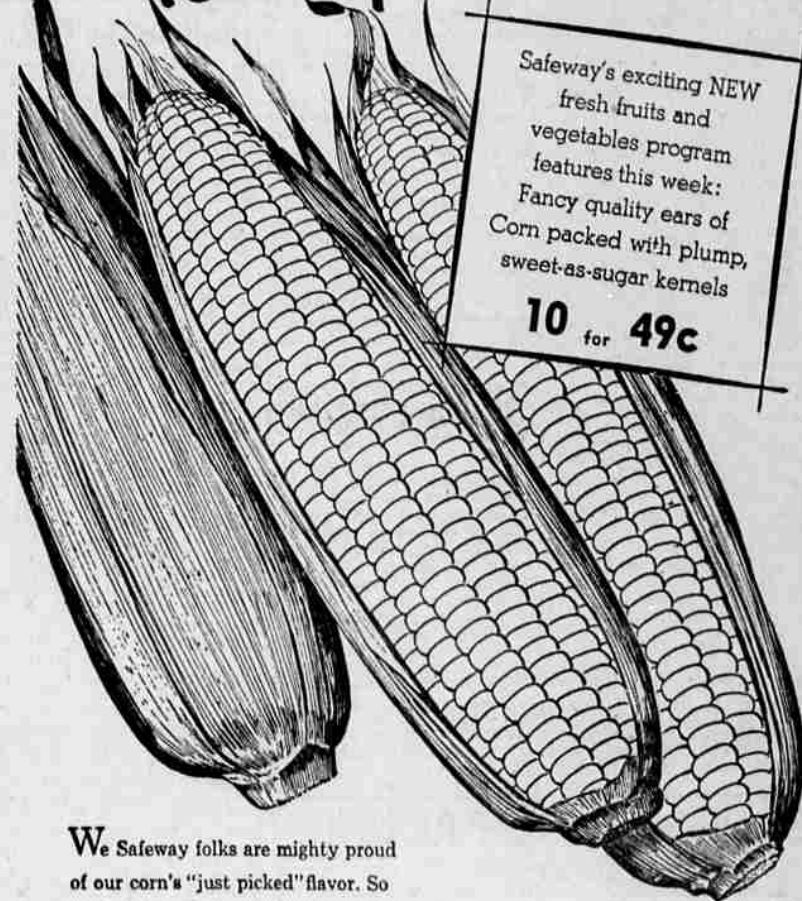

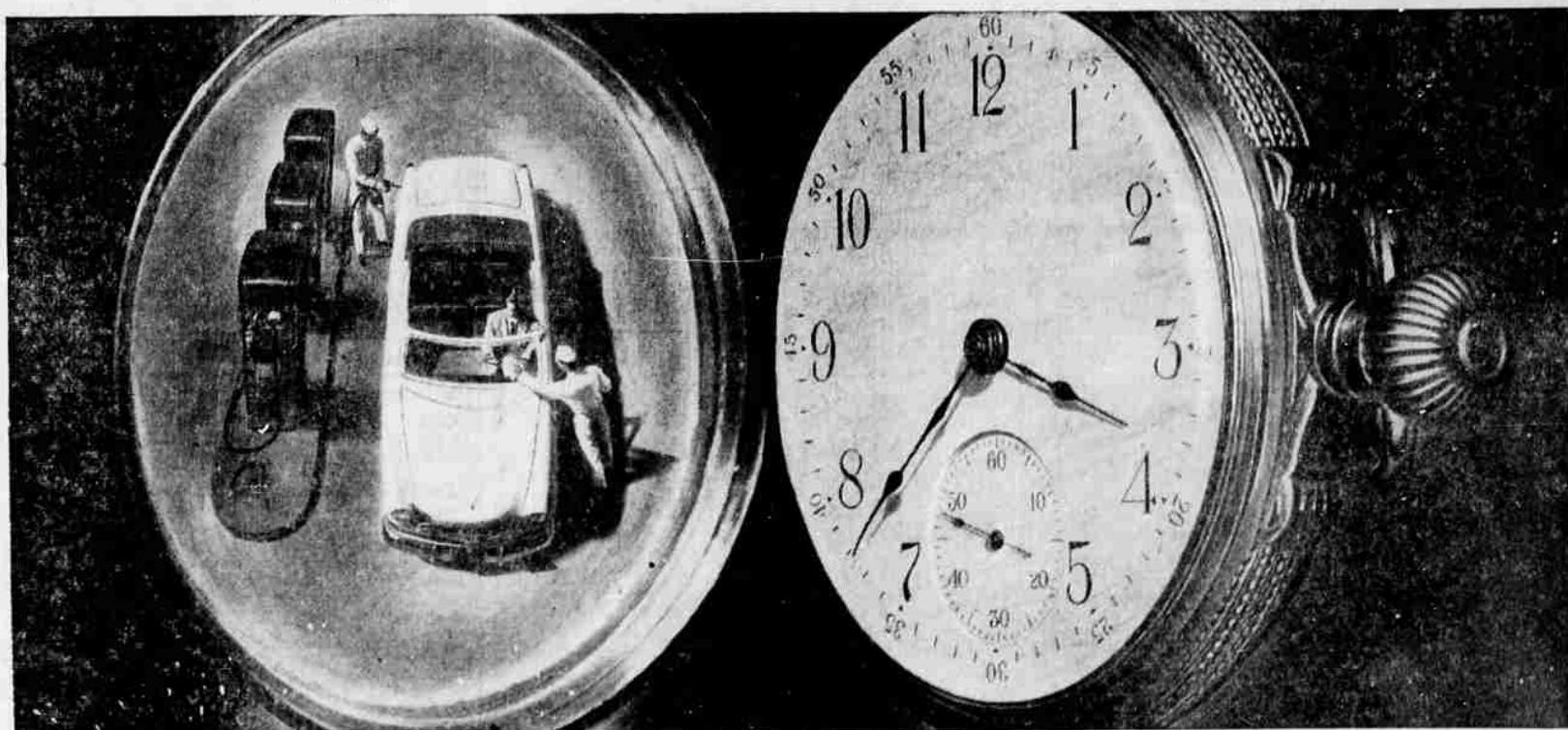
