

GIANTS WIN SERIES OPENER 5-2

At this hour yesterday Senator Pat McCarran of Nevada was alive and kicking and at age 78 as full of zing and zest and GO as the average man of half his years.

This morning he lies dead in the desert village of Hawthorne, down at the lower end of Walker lake — where the navy has a huge ammunition depot.

Such is life. Here today and gone tomorrow.

Well, he died as he would have wanted to die, in the best tradition of the Old West — with his boots on. He had just finished a vigorous political speech, in which, one may be sure, he had made his own views very clear. He was given an ovation — as he always was in Nevada.

A few minutes later he collapsed. A half hour later he was dead.

Pat McCarran was a Democrat. But he had fought both Roosevelt and Truman. He was a lone wolf. A large part of the 22 years he spent in Washington was occupied in battles with the national administrations of the Democratic party.

It could never be said positively that McCarran was either GOP or Democrat. Primarily, he was NEVADA. Whatever, in his opinion, was GOOD FOR NEVADA McCarran was for.

He was considered hopelessly conservative by the New Deal wing of his party. That was because he thought conservatism was best for his state. If he had thought that radicalism was best for Nevada, he would have been a radical. I suspect that if he had thought socialism was good for Nevada he would have been a socialist.

Is that the ideal pattern for an American senator?

I doubt it. Fundamentally, I think, I'm a states' rights. I'm sure we've concentrated too much authority in Big Government in Washington. But, in the modern world, an American statesman must be NATION-MINDED. It can no longer be otherwise.

We must remember that Nevada is a peculiar state. When BIG mining went, Nevada's glamorous past went with it. That explains the peculiar institution of legal gambling in Nevada. Nevadans don't like it any better than able-minded citizens everywhere. But legalized gambling fits Nevada's peculiar economic situation.

Anyway, Nevada was Pat McCarran's life. He will be missed everywhere, for he was a colorful character, but he will be missed especially in his home state.

Changing the subject, a professor of criminology (Dr. Douglas Kellogg) tells the 88th annual convention of American police chiefs in New Orleans that one way to control traffic accidents would be to have a SATURATION of plainly marked police cars on the highways all the time.

That, he said, would be the BEST way to control the psychopathic driver, who, he added, can be made to obey the law only when he realizes that "swift, immutable punishment invariably follows his violations of the law."

What is a psychopathic driver? The dictionary tells us a psychopath is "a person affected with psychopathy." It defines psychopathy as "a mental disorder characterized by eccentricity, emotional instability, perversity of conduct, undue conceit and suspiciousness, or lack of common sense, social feeling or self control."

That pretty adequately describes a certain type of driver on our highways. I suppose such drivers can be controlled only by policemen on the job. But if we try to SATURATE our highways with cops it will cost so much that we can't stand the drain on our pocketbooks.

Personally, I think EDUCATION is the more logical approach. I think perhaps modern machines have grown faster than our ability to handle them. Education is about the only answer to that problem. It will take time, but all important human projects take time.

Eisenhower Lauds Press

"A sign of free government, a free press is a primary source of that government's strength. It informs the people so that they may well discharge their responsibilities as citizens. It provides them and their elected representatives with a wide range of fact and opinion which must be weighed by all who are concerned with the well-being of our country."

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KMSB Faces Damage Suit In KF Court

When a second panel of veniremen was exhausted Wednesday noon in the malpractice suit against Klamath Medical Service Bureau and Dr. Raymond H. Englecke, lawyers for the plaintiff and the defendants stipulated the action could be tried before Judge Vandenberg without a jury. It was entered in the record that all of the lawyers said they had "utmost confidence in the judge to try the case."

A \$14,000 malpractice suit involving the Klamath Medical Service Bureau, operators of Klamath Valley Hospital, and a prominent Klamath Falls surgeon, went to trial before a jury Wednesday in Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg's court.

Named as a defendant with the hospital association is Dr. Raymond H. Englecke. The action was brought by Robert A. Smith, Bandon, Oregon.

While interrogating prospective jurors, Attorney Burl Green of Portland, counsel for Smith, indicated he will attempt to prove that through negligence on the part of the hospital his client suffered infection to his foot after it had been injured in an automobile accident in August, 1950 near Tulelake.

Attorney Green also claims that his client was forced out of the hospital after 19 days of treatment because he was out of funds.

Green also told the prospective jurors that after Smith left Klamath Valley Hospital, he entered a veterans hospital in Portland for further treatment. He said Smith complained to the hospital here that the cast on his foot was too tight before he left but no attempt was made to loosen it.

Attorney Dick Maxwell of Klamath Falls and Attorney Hugh Egan of Portland, who represent the defendants, say the alleged infection to Smith's foot resulted from his own negligence. Maxwell called attention to the fact that Smith fully recovered from the injury. He also said a doctor who gives his best efforts to treating a patient cannot be blamed if results of the treatment are not all that the patient expects.

Lawrence Brown, manager of the medical service, was in court with Dr. Englecke.

Anticipating that the panel of veniremen might be exhausted before a jury was selected, Judge Vandenberg ordered a special panel of 10 persons summoned.

Senator Pat McCarran Dies After Democrat Rally Talk

HAWTHORNE, Nev. (AP) — Veteran Sen. Pat McCarran of Nevada, a lone wolf Democrat who battled national Democratic administrations most of his 22 years in Washington, died last night—brief moments after a vigorous speech aimed at strengthening his waning grip on state Democratic circles.

The 78-year-old lawmaker, fourth in Senate seniority, collapsed as he walked up an aisle surrounded by well-wishers following a Democratic rally in this western Nevada town.

Chatting and shaking hands, the white-haired McCarran suddenly fell to the floor of the civic center. He was pronounced dead 20 minutes later after two doctors had worked over him with a respirator.

Dr. E. F. Hanson, Mineral County health officer, said McCarran died of a coronary occlusion—a blocking of a blood vessel leading to the heart.

McCarran's death was the ninth of a senator in this session of Congress. The Republicans have 48 Senators, the Democrats 46 and one is independent, Wayne Morse of Oregon.

Republican Gov. Charles Russell, in Las Vegas on a campaign tour, would not discuss his choice for a successor, but presumably he will appoint a Republican.

Whether he will name a successor before the November election was a matter of speculation. The governor is running for a second term and many feel he will wait until after November.

"Nevada has lost a great citizen and a great statesman," was the governor's only comment.

Only last week McCarran came out in support of the state Democratic ticket—a lineup that included the fiery senator had fought politically for years.

PORTLAND (AP) — Eight persons were killed and 22 were wounded in last year's hunting season, the State Game Commission reported Tuesday.

The commission announced the figures as a warning to hunters who will take to the woods Saturday when deer hunting season opens.

Of the fatal gun accidents, three were from accidental discharge and three victims were mistaken for game. One hunter accidentally shot himself. The cause of the other death was not known.

TV Broadcast Goes Berserk

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — An electronic monster here went berserk Tuesday night, giving television viewers a picture from one network and sound effects from another at the same time.

For one minute and seven seconds, "Truth or Consequences" disappeared from the BC-TV network picture screens and was replaced by "Life with Father" from CBS-TV.

But as viewers watched "Father" they heard the "Truth" commercial.

Swamped with inquiries, NBC told set owners: "It's not your set—it's the whole network."

The Pacific Telephone & Telegraph Co., said a relay machine at the main switching point near San Francisco went out of order, but engineers quickly flipped some switches and set it right.

French Arms Plan Studied By Allies

LONDON (AP) — High French sources asserted Wednesday the nine-power conference on European defense had accepted a plan by French Premier Pierre Mendes-France to control continental troops and armaments under a seven-nation European pact.

The informants made their statements after Mendes-France and West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer conferred for more than an hour Wednesday morning, then joined the second day's full session of the nine-power meeting.

High Allied sources presented a somewhat different picture. They said France and her allies have tentatively approved a plan whereby controls would be exercised by both the seven-nation authority and the supreme commander of (NATO) Allied powers in Europe, Gen. Alfred M. Gruenther. Details of this compromise formula, they said, have yet to be worked out.

BRITISH PLAN

Other Western powers had backed a British plan under which control of troops and armaments would be exercised by the North Atlantic Treaty Organization, to which a free and rearmament Germany would be admitted as the 15th member.

There was no confirmation from other conference sources of the statement from the French informants.

The French sources said Mendes-France's plan was accepted after the Premier agreed to the simultaneous admittance of the Bonn government into the new seven-power alliance and NATO. The seven-power pact would be an enlargement of the 1948 Brussels pact, whose present members and France, Britain, The Netherlands, Belgium and Luxembourg. The new members would be West Germany and Italy.

AGGRESSION

The original pact bound the members to aid each other in case of an attack, especially by Germany. Those sections dealing with German aggression are being rewritten by the permanent council of the Brussels pact, meeting here simultaneously with the nine foreign ministers.

Other conference sources reported Mendes-France had made clear in a long speech that his country favors a package deal incorporating two agreements:

1. An over-all method of controlling German rearmament.
2. A French-German agreement on the Saar placing that disputed coal-producing border state under control of the new seven-nation group.

The French plan calls for the seven-nation authority to fix the maximum size of the armed forces contributed by the members and would also control the movements of the troops on the continent.

Hunting Regulations For Indian Reservation Told

Despite rumors to the contrary official sources have stated that the Klamath Indian Reservation, now in the process of liquidation through a four year process, is not open to hunting by non-Indians.

A statement made at the request of the district court by a representative of the attorney general's office says in part: "The Indian tribes of 1864, ratified on July 2, 1866, proclaimed February 17, 1870, makes no provision relative to the rights of the Indian tribes involved as to hunting or trapping. The treaty does, however, give them exclusive fishing rights. There is no agreement existing between the Klamath Indians or any statute with respect to hunting or trapping on the reservation or in the Indian country. Reference to Title 18, Section 1162, USCA, of which Public Law 280 is an amendment, will define Indian country which as you will observe includes the Indian reservation proper or deeded or patented land within the limits of an Indian reservation or highways, villages, and other municipalities within the limits of such reservation."

"Since the Klamath Indians have no hunting rights afforded under federal treaty, agreement or statute it is my opinion that they are now in the same category as other citizens of the state of Oregon, that is to say all enrolled Indians of the Klamath Reservation may hunt on the Indian reservation or in Indian country without a license as is provided by the Oregon Game Code to the effect that the owner of land and members of his immediate family may hunt on such land without a license, except that all persons including landowners must obtain a license to hunt big game and must obtain a big game tag. It is also my opinion that Public Law 280 does not confer any rights on white citizens of the state of Oregon to hunt on Indian land without specific consent by the owners of deeded or patented land, or without the formal consent of the Klamath Tribal Council."

Violators of the regulations will be charged by enforcement officers with trespass and face trial in the district court.

Indians, while they may hunt on any tribal lands, must, under these regulations, procure a hunting license, big game tag, and may only kill deer within the prescribed Oregon season.

While under treaty rights the Indians were not afforded the opportunity of special hunting rights, a subsequent federal ruling permitted the killing of big game (deer) throughout the year as a means of sustenance. Now that federal authority for enforcement of the laws has been withdrawn this ruling does not apply, according to Sgt. Tichenor, Oregon State Police.

NEW YORK (AP) — Pinch hitter Jim "Dusty" Rhodes slammed a home run off the top of the right field wall in the tenth inning and scored behind Willie Mays and Hank Thompson to give the New York Giants a 3 to 2 victory over the Cleveland Indians in the first game of the World Series Wednesday.

Rhodes' wallop, which spoiled a fine pitching performance by Cleveland's Bob Lemon, came with one out, Mays walked and stole second and then Thompson was given an intentional pass to set the stage for the winning blow.

The Giants tied the score in the second inning after Cleveland had scored twice in the first. From there on it was a scoreless struggle until the tenth.

Lemon went all the way for Cleveland while Sal Maglie, the Giants' starter, was relieved in the eighth. Mary Grissom, who snuffed out Cleveland's eighth-inning threat, was the winning pitcher.

A capacity crowd of 52,751 paid \$316,957.25 to see the game.

Reserve Group Backs Fleming

RACINE, Wis. (AP) — A sharply worded resolution calling upon the Army to "exonerate" Lt. Col. Harry Fleming, who was convicted by a court martial of collaborating with Communists in a Korean prisoner of war camp, was adopted Tuesday night by the Racine chapter of the Reserve Officers' Assn.

The chapter, of which Col. Fleming was formerly a member, demanded an investigation to fix responsibility for what it called Fleming's "unlawful imprisonment" before his trial. The court martial verdict ordered Fleming's dismissal from the Army with forfeiture of allowances.

The resolution also took the Army to task for having "singled out a reserve officer to the exclusion of regular Army officers, including graduates of the U.S. Military Academy, to be publicly degraded and humiliated by trying him before a general court martial for activities, which the sworn testimony of records proves was common for all the prisoners of war during internment by the Communists during the Korean War."

Thieves Fail To Break Vault

HELPER, Kan. (AP) — Hard-working burglars failed to break into the vault of the Helper State Bank — apparently losing seven cents in the effort.

The thieves broke into the bank during the night, finally knocked the combination of the vault but didn't get in. Bank officials who had to call a safe expert to open the vault yesterday said nothing was missing.
