The ICCNC asked support in voting out Proposition 17 on the November ballot. This proposition would permit use of motor vehicle taxes and motor vehicle registra-

tion fees to finance planning and construction of vehicle parking facilities. The ICCNC felt highway funds should be reserved for highway uses, at least until all roads are brought to a reasonable standard. Another item discussed was continuance of the 6 cent gasoline tax, and that the legislature at their session in January would be asked to make this a permanent law, as a necessity to build main road arteries, etc.
