A former Klamath Falls resident, Noah H. Weaver, 34, was found dead, presumably from asphyxia-

tion following a fire in a Eureka, California tavern early Sunday morning, September 26. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Norman H.

Weaver, 3640 Blabee Street, Klamath Falls.

Weaver, a resident of Eureka for the past six years, occupied an apartment over the bar. His two room apartment had an outside entrance and Weaver's body was found about four feet from his bed, lying on the floor.

The fire that was confined to the first floor of the building, apparently started from a beer cooler.

He was employed by the M & M Plywood Company. He was a veteran of World War II, serving in the U. S. Army 3rd Division.

He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Norman H. Weaver of this city, brothers, James, Donald and Cecil; sisters, Mrs. Dorothy Valencia and Mrs. Mildred Kasper, all of Klamath Falls.
