Fred Hutchinson Headed For Suds

SEATTLE (AP) — Fred Hutchinson, resigned manager of the Detroit Tigers, had the inside track Friday to return to his native Seattle as pilot of the Pacific Coast League Rainiers.

Hutchinson resigned after 2 1/2 years as Detroit manager. Hutchinson quit Thursday because of Tiger management refusal to give him a new two-year contract.

Soriano said he was ready to outbid the Baltimore Orioles, who were reported interested in acquiring Hutchinson as a coach.

The Seattle general manager said he also has arranged a meeting with Rogers Hornsby, who led Seattle to the Coast League pennant in 1951, in Chicago, but indicated the Rainiers were interested in Hutchinson.

Emil Sick, owner of the Rainiers, said here he believed a reasonable agreement could be worked out with Hutchinson but said he too would balk at a two-year contract.

"By doing a good job with us (as a one-year pact)," Sick said, "he can go back to the majors on his own terms . . ."

Out Of Doors With The Sportsman

For the next 16 days, deer hunters will take to the woods like children to candy, as the 1954 buck hunting season opens tomorrow and unless everyone cooperates 100 per cent, human lives will be at stake, as well as deer.

There are so many people who enjoy the sport of camping outside and going after that big fellow with the huge rack, that some of them are bound and determined to do anything they can to get their tag filled regardless of someone else's safety.

Here are just a few rules that should be used for the next few weeks, in a desperate move to make it possible for everyone who is hunting this year to be back at it again next October.

Listed first among the 10 commandments of safety, put out by the Sporting Arms and Ammunition Manufacturers' Institute, who is trying to keep shooting a safe sport, was the old rule of treat every gun with the respect due a loaded gun. This has been and always will be a cardinal rule of the sport.

The next three rules are very important to your hunting partner's safety as well as your own. Carry only empty guns, taken down or broken, with the action open in your automobile or camp site.

Always be sure that the barrel and action are clear of obstructions, and carry your gun so that you can control the direction of

the muzzle, even if you should stumble or fall. Keep the safety on until you are ready to shoot.

Number five, six and seven have to do with not only the safety of other hunters but to members of your family or friends. Never point your gun at anything you don't want to shoot, be sure of your target (buck, doe or human) before pulling the trigger and never leave a loaded gun unattended.

Never climb a tree or a fence with a shell in your chamber, do not shoot at any flat, hard surface or into water, and the number one rule to follow by all means, do not mix gunpowder with alcohol.

If you can't go without a drink while hunting go back to town or some place else where you can't endanger anyone's life by your own or your partner's.

These above mentioned rules have been repeated in the ears of most people since they were "over a high" in a grasshopper, but even so every year you read it in the newspaper, or hear it over the radio that some one was shot in a hunting accident. Why???

If (which is a very big word, especially to some of the hunters that take to the woods nowadays) all the rules and safety precautions were to be taken seriously and followed closely, there would be no hunting accidents that involved a shooting.

Let's all work together and see if Klamath County can come through open season on everything that walks, crawls or breaths, with a clean record for your sake and mine.

ACCORDING TO butchers at the Klamath Falls Crenery who are in the deer handling business for skinning, cutting, wrapping and storing, the most important step in hunting is to be able to take care of your kill after you have shot it.

To spike any thoughts to the idea that on hot days, the smaller the cut, while cleaning the deer, the better, Cy Baker points out that the animal has to be thoroughly cooled out and to do this the larger the hole made for the cleaning of entrails the better.

After the deer is cleaned on the inside be sure and hang it in head first, in the cool of the shade and let him cool out further or better yet, take him somewhere to be kept cool, such as commercial coolers if you don't do your own skinning and cutting up.

Baker also stated that if anyone would be interested in watching deer being taken care of at the creamery Saturdays on Sunday evenings, they are invited to come in and see how it is done. The entrance is on Klamath Avenue across the street from the main building of the plant.

CLEVELAND (AP) — At least you won't hear much about Chinese (short) home runs the next few days. The Municipal Stadium dimensions are 330 feet to left field, 350 to left center, 419 to straightaway center, 330 to right center and 320 to the right field fence.

The 1954 series attendance is running behind last year's, but Friday's crowd should even things up, at least. The Polo Grounds paid 101,550 customers compared with 136,100. The Indians had more hits (16-13), extra base hits (5-3) and walks (11-7).
