

Nevada Republicans Seek Court Action On Election

Nevada Republicans say they'll seek court action in the state's 17 counties to keep a U.S. Senate race off the November ballot. The Nevada Supreme Court yesterday declined to rule on the question.

The GOP wants to block a vote because it might give another Democrat the seat of the late Sen. Pat McCarran. Without a vote, a Republican would hold the seat by appointment.

Stumping the Northeast for the GOP, Vice President Nixon said last night the Communist issue should be taken out of politics.

This could be done, he said, if voters support the Eisenhower administration.

Addressing a GOP rally at Nor-

walk, Conn., Nixon said the ad-

ministration has a better record

than the Democrats in dealing with

the Communist problem because

"we had no Communist skeletons

in our political closet."

Democrat Adlai Stevenson last

night called Nixon "the most elo-

quent gloom and doom prophet in

America today." At a Rockford,

Ill., rally for Sen. Paul Douglas

(D-Ill.), Stevenson said Nixon "has

told us everything else must be

gone to secure a Republican

majority in Congress or else the

Republican party will be doomed."

In Nevada, Republican Gov.

Charles Russell yesterday appoint-

ed Reno attorney Ernest Brown

to McCarran's seat. If there is

no November vote, Brown will hold

the seat until January 1957.

An election would pit Brown

against Alan Bible, another Reno

attorney and a protégé of McCar-

ran. Should Bible win, he would

then take over McCarran's seat

from Brown.

The GOP's Supreme Court in-

junction to bar the certification

of Brown and Bible as November can-

didates. The high court refused to

act, saying the Republicans "have

a remedy in the lower courts."

Bible was named the Democratic

candidate yesterday by the state

Democratic committee.

GOP National Chairman Leonard

Hall said yesterday Democratic

Chairman Stephen A. Mitchell

should apologize to Nixon "for call-

ing him a liar or remove his signa-

ture" from a statement of cam-

paign ethics both chairmen signed

last month.

Hall said Mitchell called a Nixon

statement about the administra-

tion's security risk program "an

outright lie." He said Mitchell

"irresponsibly based his charge"

"on a misquotation."

Secretary of Commerce Weeks

addressed a GOP dinner in Kan-

sas City last night and urged the

election of a Republican Congress

"instead of taking a chance on

those who might scuttle things."

Weeks said the country now has

"both peace and a steadily increas-

ing prosperity."

Another cabinet member, Secre-

tary of the Treasury Humphrey,

said in Austin, Tex., "there has

been a good deal of nonsense and

misinformation in recent weeks

falsely suggesting that the admin-

istration's tax program might not

be in the best interest of all of

our citizens."

Humphrey, appearing at a Uni-

versity of Texas tax institute, es-

timated the new tax law, would

cost corporations a net tax in-

crease of 664 million dollars this

year.

Nixon Blasts 'Left Wingers'

NORWALK, Conn. (AP)—Vice Pres-

ident Richard M. Nixon says the

"left wing" of the Americans For

Democratic Action "is in the

ascendency in the Democratic

party."

Nixon said at a state GOP rally

last night that the ADA, formed

by New Dealers, "controlled the

1952 (Presidential nominating) con-

vention in Chicago," and he added:

"Its record on the internal Com-

munist issue is not one which in-

spires confidence, despite the pro-

testations of its individual mem-

bers to the contrary."

Nixon, making a Northeast cam-

paign tour for Republican candi-

dates, said the Democrats failed in

dealing with the Communist prob-

lem because a few of their leaders

"underestimated and ignored the

danger, covered it up when it was

exposed and refused to cooperate

with and heed the warnings of J.

Edgar Hoover and the FBI."

Nixon added he did not feel that

"Democrats are less loyal than

Republicans."

On the other hand, he said, the

Republicans "have done a better

job" because "we recognized the

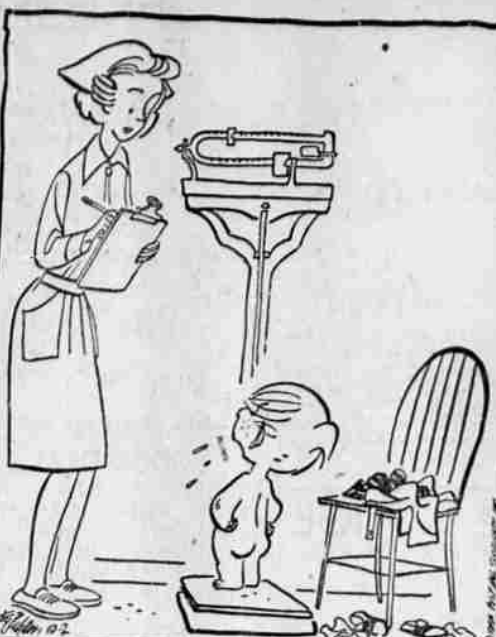
danger for what it was."

"We had no communist skeletons

Small Girl Dies In Windstorm

CANTON, Ohio (AP)—A powerful

windstorm smashed into a north-

eastern Ohio farmhouse last night

killing a 3-year-old girl and injur-

ing her mother, father and infant

brother.

The storm-witnesses called it a

tornado—leveling every building on

the farm of James Smiley near

Minerva, Ohio, after his family had

gone to bed. Carrie Smiley was

killed.

City hospital in Alliance said

Smiley, 34, was in fair condition

and his wife, Alice, 30, and their

14-month-old son, James Allen,

were in "fairly good" shape.

The storm toppled homes, swept

off roofs, uprooted trees and tore

down power lines in the area and

then blew itself out in Pennsyl-

vania.

No damage estimates were avail-

able.
