## Forestry Official Issues Fire Warning To Hunters

Careless hunters were responsible for the start of nearly half of last year's man-caused fires on lands protected by the U.S. Forest Service in the Pacific Northwest region, according to word received from Kermit W. Linstedt, regional fire control chief.

Hunters who abandoned warning fires were the major offenders in the ratio of two to one over careless smokers and those abandoning their campfires, Linstedt stated.

State and federal foresters and the Keep Green associations, as well as many private timber owners are cooperating with game officials and state police in a concentrated effort to reduce these unnecessary forest and range fires.

A review of past fire and weather records brings out one of the chief reasons for concern this year. Hunters have shown a tendency to become careless during or following cool, damp weather, game and forest protection officials agree. Western Washington and Oregon have had the most favorable fire weather in many years. Linstedt points out, however, that while western stations were reporting fuel moisture readings in the 10-15 per cent range, many east-side fire weather stations have reported the fuel moisture down to 5 and 6 per cent. With fuels that dry, fires can and do spread rapidly, he said. This is further illustrated by the large fire on Hart Mountain in southern Oregon during the recent archery season.

There is no cause for complacency about fire at any time, Linstedt said. Warning fires and camp fires should be built only at camp in cleared places where they are safe and extinguished completely with water or by mixing with cool, damp earth till every spark is out. Foot travelers should smoke only in safe places while stopped and make sure that pipe ashes and cigar or cigarette stubs are cold before discarding.

He expressed high praise for the many careful hunters, saying that they not only take care of their own fires but often find and put out fires left by others.

Campfire permits are needed if a hunter plans to camp out on National Forest land and may be obtained at any Ranger Station.

For the convenience of people who plan to camp in the Fremont or Rogue River National Forests, permits may be obtained at the post office building in Klamath Falls, or the Ranger Station at Bly, Lakeview, Silver Lake or Paisley.

Their rest offices at Bly and Lakeview will be open 24 hours a day this weekend as a concerted

## Salmon Run In Grande Ronde

Spring chinook salmon once again ran the Grande Ronde River in numbers which old-timers have not seen in over 39 years. Nearly 100 salmon were seen by commission personnel in a three-mile area near Woodley. By airplane count, 83 reds were recorded on the upper river and 19 reds on lower Sheper Creek. For many years prior to the early 1900s, splash dams and other barriers near Perry practically eliminated chinook salmon migration in the river. Successful spawning this year may be the beginning of an established run of chinook on the Grande Ronde.
