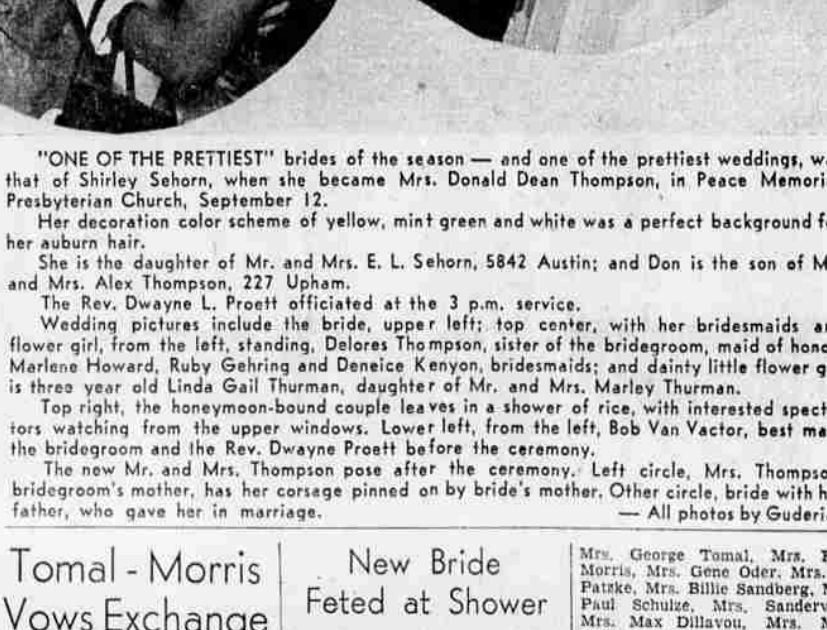
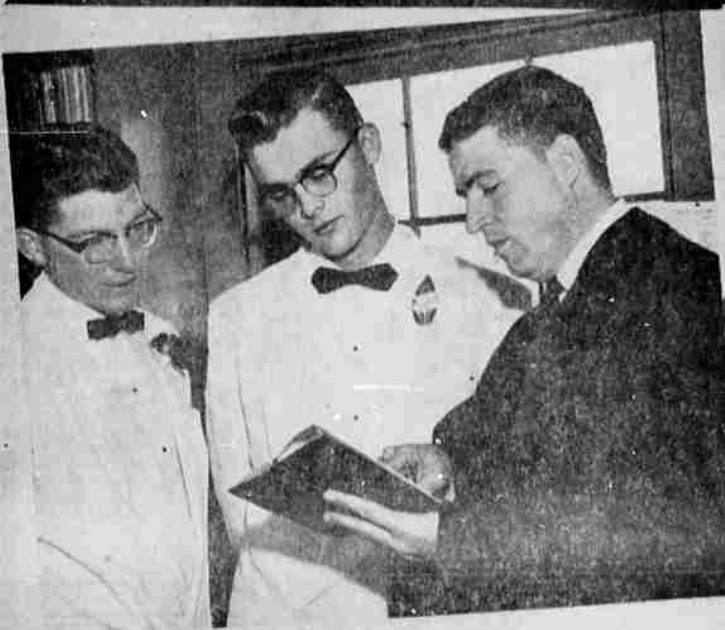




THOMPSON-SEHORN RITES

The Rev. Dwayne L. Proett read the 3 p.m. service in the presence of a large group of friends and relatives. Mrs. William Hamilton played incidental wedding music.

In a gown of white nylon tulle with Chantilly lace appliques on the full skirt of net over slipper satin, Shirley was escorted down the aisle which was draped with white silk rope, and marked on alternate pews with yellow and white bows.

A hooped petticoat emphasized the full skirt with chapel train. The bodice was made with a low oval neckline, short sleeves and fitted waistline. She wore long mitts of tulle, appliqued with lace, and pointed at the wrist. Her bouquet of white gardenias and bouvardia was tied with loops of pearls. A Juliet cap in a lattice design of seed pearls held her fingertip veil of illusion. Her "old" was an heirloom handkerchief belonging to her aunt, Mrs. E. M. Dickey, Portland. "Borrowed" earrings from Mrs. T. D. Sehorn, and she wore the traditional blue garter and penny in her shoe.

Games were played with prizes going to Mrs. George Tomal and Mrs. August Tikkanen.

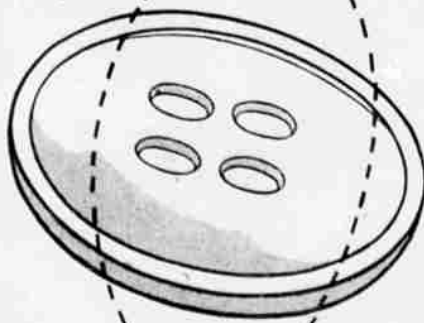
