Gunman Kills Two Victims

PALMERTON, Pa. — A justice of the peace and his wife were shot down last night as they were entering a church where they sang in the choir.

The assailant fled while a crowd of youths, including the couple's 16-year-old son, chased him.

The victims were Matthew Daneker, 38, and his wife, Mildred, 35.

A witness, the Rev. Milton E. Dettler, pastor of the Trinity Evangelical Congregational Church to which the dead couple belonged, said the assailant was standing "within three feet" of Mrs. Daneker when he fired a pistol. A single bullet struck her in the chest. She was pronounced dead on arrival at Palmerton Hospital.

The pastor said as Daneker grappled with the man for the weapon, several shots were fired and Daneker fell. He died at the hospital without regaining consciousness.

Police said they were seeking Daniel Falcone, 48, a shirt factory worker, for questioning in connection with the shooting.

Thief Grabs Plenty Of Free Rides

TYLER, Tex. (P) — A pistol-waving bandit entered the Tyler Transit Co. office last night, forced nightwatchman A. R. Phillips into a closet and headed for the safe.

In it, he spied a bulging money sack. He grabbed it and fled, apparently thinking he had the day's receipts.

Company owner B. C. Curry said the sack contained 2,100 bus tokens.

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Cancer Suit Filer Dies Of Cancer
