A farm daughter from Washington County, Iowa is the new "children's librarian" at the Klamath County Library.

Irma M. Wood, (Mrs. Clifford P.) who started writing fiction on the banks of a prairie stream while still in pigtails, has also piled up an amazing amount of knowledge on what makes children tick. She succeeds Mary Kenai who has gone to Japan.

While she was still very young, her father retired and moved to California. From Glendale high school she went to the Stanford School of Nursing, graduated and worked for three years in the nurse's library. Her B.A. degree was earned at Immaculate Heart College in Los Angeles and during the years she studied there, Irma pounded the corridors of a juvenile home in the night hours to help make her way through school.

She did some practice teaching in the University of California, took extension courses on Oregon School Law and History of Oregon from the U of O.

For three years the new librarian was a staff member at the Los Angeles Juvenile Hall. . . she taught in the elementary grades

in Bridgeport and went into the cow country of Nevada to work as a public health nurse in Elko County.

It was in Nevada that Irma Wood met her future husband while visiting a guest ranch.

The year 1938 found her in Kemmerer, Wyoming putting on a health demonstration program under sponsorship of the school board and the American Red Cross.

Four bouncing youngsters arrived between 1938 and 1951 and kept Irma Wood jumping from bassinette to binding bruises. Sylvia now 16 is a junior in KUHS. Clifford Junior is 12, Gay, a second daughter is nine and the baby of the family is Jack, a busy six year old.

Mrs. Wood has taught children

on a U.S. Air Base in eastern Oregon, organized child study clubs in Missouri and put on a weekly radio program on community problems.

She knows boys and girls by their first names at Peterson, Summers, Henley and Altamont Junior High schools. . . is a member of the American Association of University Women, a member of the board of directors of the League of Women Voters, an officer in the Council of Church Women, is a member of the Presbyterian Church. Just now she is industriously searching the keys of her Underwood for Cs and Ts while she learns the touch system.

Husband Clifford Wood is an electronics specialist at the Klamath Falls airport and like all husbands, loves chocolate cake. . . of course Irma Wood can bake one.

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both as individuals and as a group. Klamath Falls is widely known as a transient town.

The result of three years of study of school records of freshmen entering Klamath Union High School has turned up some interesting facts refuting the belief that many residents stay for only a short time.

Two measures of the stability of the population were studied, the length of time that students spend

in elementary schools which feed into KUHS and birthplaces of students.

The study revealed that 46 per cent of the freshmen entering KUHS attended either Fremont, Altamont or Fairhaven for the eight grades and 75 per cent completed at least one-half their previous schooling in these feeder schools.

Almost 40 per cent of the fresh-

men during the past three years have been born in Klamath Falls. An additional 15 per cent were born outside the city in Oregon and by actual count 63 per cent are native Oregonians. Sixty three per cent were born on the West Coast in Oregon, California or Washington.

Another 14 per cent were born in the midwest and 10 per cent were born in the southwest.

The guests played bridge.

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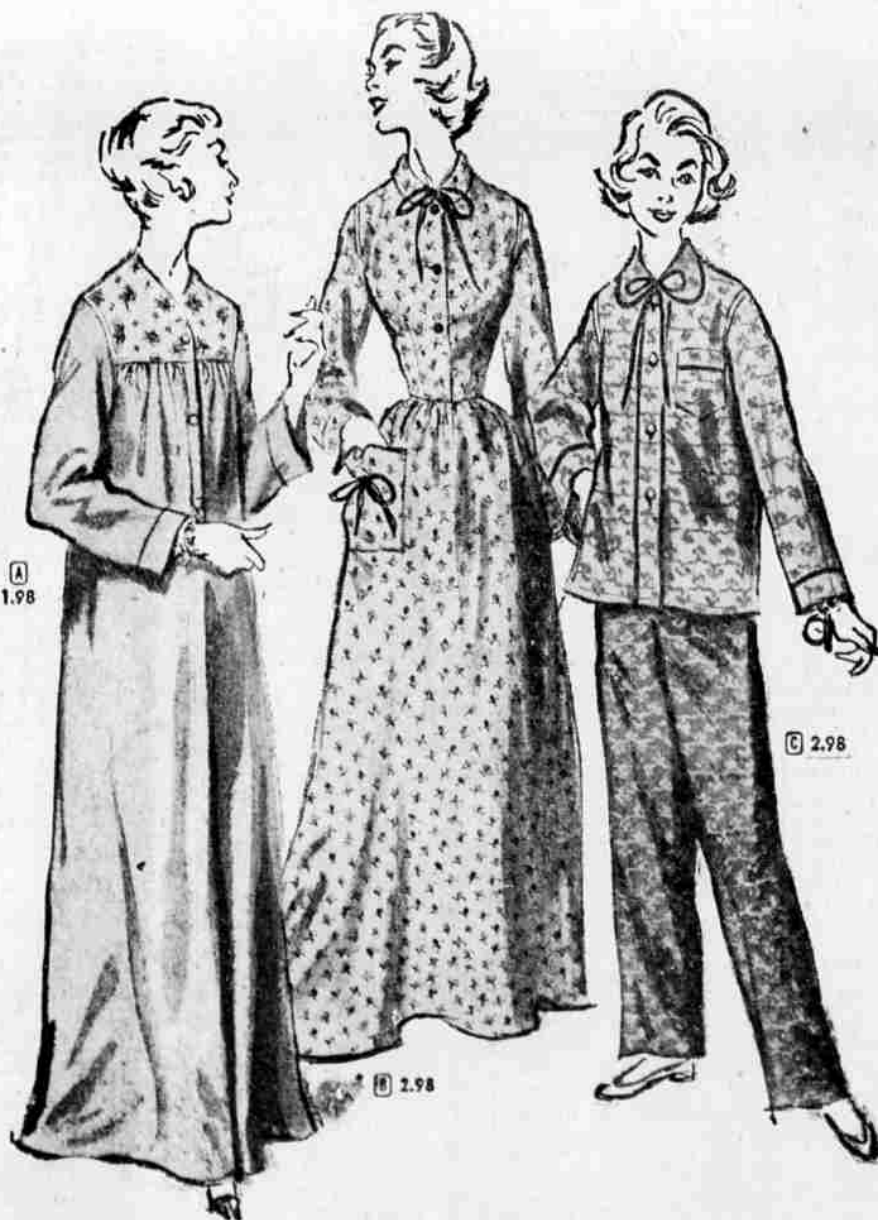
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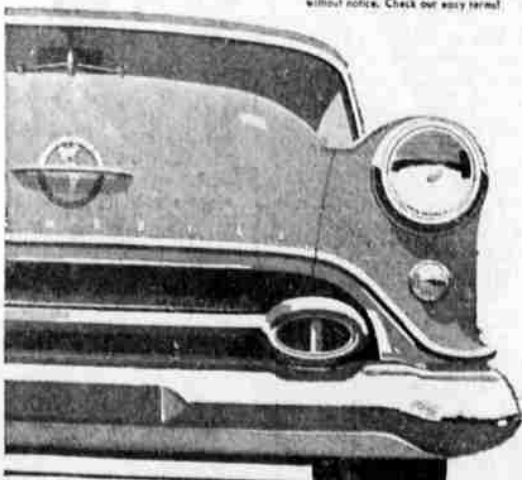
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WHAT CONGRESSMAN SAM COON HAS DONE FOR THE FARMERS
