Prior to the program there will be a short business meeting. Bob Puckett, executive secretary of the Klamath County United Fund, will speak about the drive which will start October 20. He will point out how important the United Fund is to every individual and to every agency in the county.
The object of the Inter-Agency Council is to promote the general welfare of the community through cooperative planning and coordination of the membership agencies. Membership consists of representatives of the following agencies: Allied Veterans' Council, Boy Scouts, Camp Fire Girls, City of Klamath Falls and City Police, City Recreation Department, City Schools, County Schools, 4-H Clubs, Girl Scouts, Juvenile Office, Klamath County TB & Health Unit, O.T.I., Red Cross, Salvation Army, Social Employment Service, Chamber of Commerce, Klamath County Veterans' Service Office, County Council of P.T.A., County Court, Parents and Patrons, Klamath Ministerial Association and the YMCA.

Dump Charge To Be Talked

Members of the city utilities committee scheduled a meeting for late Tuesday afternoon to discuss the possibility of charging for dumping at the city dump.
A letter from Don McDowell, Klamath Disposal Company, read at city council Monday night requested permission to charge for dumping without exception because of the exorbitant cost of maintaining the dump for public use and the new expensive equipment which must be paid for.
At the present time, the dump is used by people of Klamath Falls and surrounding areas and commercially by business establishments without charge. The company has requested the following charges:
Automobile, one can, no charge; automobile, over one can, 25 cents; trailers, 50 to 75 cents; pickups, 50 to 75 cents; trucks, \$1 to \$1.50; car bodies, 75 cents.
A survey by the company of surrounding cities where the dump is not county or municipally owned, shows that a charge is made for dumping without exception.

Organist To Appear In Klamath

Lauren B. Sykes, associate and choirmaster of the American Guild of Organists and popular recitalist of Portland, will appear as guest artist of the Klamath Falls chapter of the guild in concert at the Zion Lutheran Church, Monday, October 11. The concert will start promptly at 8 p.m.
Sykes is associated with two theological colleges of Portland and for the past several seasons has been associate conductor and organist for the Portland Symphony Choir. He plays the keyboard instruments, pipe organ, piano, harpsichord and Celesta for the Portland Symphony orchestra and last season appeared twice as soloist for this group.
His organ accompaniments of the major oratorios broadcast over numerous networks have brought enthusiastic praise notices from all parts of the country.
His program here will include classic, romantic and modern selections designed for a well-balanced program. He will present an afternoon concert at Sacred Heart Church where interest in the organ is on the increase.
Attendance is by membership in the guild.
The Klamath Falls chapter of the guild was organized last March, largely through the efforts of Ernest Armstrong, organist of Immanuel Baptist Church.
After being elected by the national council, the group began with a membership of 21 charter members. Since then seven new organists and choir directors have been added.

The crew of a Danish fishing vessel found her body in the North Sea near Esbjerg, Denmark, Monday. She had taken off from here Sunday in an attempt to better the flight of 22 hours and 40 minutes by Alia Rondraeva, a Russian. Mrs. Weber, owner of a Russian beauty shop had made 230 ascensions, including a flight of 21 hours and 15 minutes in 1953.

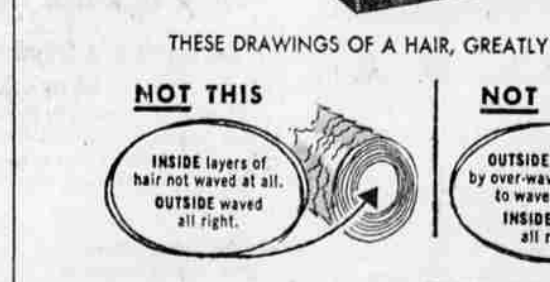
