

Pels, Grizzlies Tangle

Ashland Looking For Upset

This Friday night at Modoc Field, the Klamath Union High School Pelicans move back on to the gridiron after a week's lay-off, as they meet the Ashland Grizzlies in a non-conference game.

Captain John McGinnis and the Pelicans have more than their share of work cut out for them this week, in the low lying Grizzlies who have been beaten by both Grants Pass and Medford so far this season.

From a reliable source comes word that none of the valley teams, Ashland, Medford or Grants Pass will bow to the Pelicans this season, and this Friday will tell one third of the story, as the Grizzlies and Pelicans battle to see if the tale is true.

Ashland has a stronger team than the past season games have shown, and is promising to shake the Pels' two game winning streak off and hand them their second loss of the season.

RUNNING ATTACK

Leading the Ashland attack will be Jerry Mickle, Grizzle quarterback, Gene Parent and junior end, who has shown great possibilities in their last few games. The Grizzlies' running attack is also sharpened since the Medford-Grants Pass games as the addition of Gregg Furry, a transfer from Washington, has given them a better moving attack from the fullback spot.

For McGinnis and his two assistants, they face the tough assignment of filling the shoes of letterman end Guy Munsell, who gave up football following an injury in the Redding game which the Pels won 19-12 on a last quarter surge.

So far, it is shaping into a four way battle for the open position with letterman Larry Heston, Earl Tichenor, Leon Brown and Bill Baderok all even-up, with any of the four getting the opening call Friday night at Munsell's wing spot.

Elvis Mitchell will be at the other end position, while the center spot will probably be worked by Denny "Little Moose" Todd or Wayne Rodgers, either of whom are capable of handling the job.

Modesto "Mighty Mo" Jimenez and Ron Morris will probably see most of the action at the guard positions, while other front line assistance can be expected from Scotty Hancock, who will play fullback on offense and guard on defense, and Roy Ropp.

COMPETITION

The tackle positions are also fairly well open with Marlin Causey and Jim McGee leading the field, as more competition is seen from Erwin Mullen, Vince "Pee Wee" Reese, Bob Harshbarger and Larry Mathews.

For Gerald Bevans, several combinations will probably be used, as the Pels' backfield boss could very well two-plateau his backs with Larry Yarnell and Butch Kimpton doing the quarterbacking, while six halfback, Dave Peppie, Chuck Gupitli, Jack Rountree, Larry Deering and Hancock will all see action as will Jim Borden.

At the remaining position in the KUHS backfield, Gerald Del Fatti and Dave Leeling will do most of the running from the fullback slot.

One loss that may hurt the Pelicans quite a bit as far as reserve bench strength is concerned is the absence of Dean Taucher, the second line quarterback behind Yarnell. Taucher has just moved to Lakeview.

Game time is 8 o'clock and reserved seat tickets are still on sale at the chamber of commerce offices, general admission seats will be placed on sale the night of the ball game.

College Grid Briefs

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The main concern Wednesday for UCLA Coach Red Sanders was a let-down for his squad stemming from the Bruin triumph over Maryland last week.

Assistant coach Bill Barnes scouted the Washington loss to Michigan and despite the defeat, relayed word to his team that the Huskies cannot be taken lightly.

While the loss of quarterback Sandy Lederman hurts the Northwest team, Barnes said another quarterback, Bob Cox, may supply ample replacement.

SEATTLE (AP) — Coach John Cherberg has taken cognizance of the fearful reputation of the UCLA line. He is drilling his University of Washington football squad on aerial tactics designed to go over instead of through the Uclan's forward wall.

Cherberg put three men from his backfield list—Bob Cox, Ron Cherry and Mel McCain—to work with other backs and ends Tuesday in a ball-tossing workout without indulging in any body contact.

Wednesday he was scheduled to put the trio to work tossing the ball in a full-scale scrimmage which should test their effectiveness for Saturday's crucial tilt with the second-ranked team in the nation.

CORVALLIS, Ore. (AP) — Oregon State Coach Kip Taylor said Tuesday he will stress fundamentals to the remaining drills this week for Saturday's game with Washington State.

Taylor said his Beavers will concentrate on blocking and tackling in the practice sessions. No scrimmage is planned.

Guards Jim Roberts and Bill Johnson were out with injuries and Taylor had them on the "doubtful" list for the WSC contest.

WSC Fullback Leads Rushing

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Washington State rests far down in Pacific Coast Conference standings, but the Cougars' fullback, Duke Washington, has taken the lead in rushing from Stanford's Bill Tarr by a scant two yards after three games this fall.

Washington has gained 232 yards for an average of 6.2, while Tarr has gained 250 for a 4.8 average.

Sandy Lederman of Washington maintained his lead in passing but a broken leg may shelve him for the season. Lederman completed 35 throws for 459 yards, with Paul Larson, California, next with 30 for 337.

Oregon's George Shaw has completed 29 for 420 yards.

Leading scorer is sophomore Jon Arnelt, Southern California, with five touchdowns for 30 points. Tarr, Bob Davenport, UCLA, and Dick James Oregon, are tied with four apiece for 24 points.

Leading pass receivers are James, with 14 for 139, and Frank Teverbaugh, Idaho, 13 for 104.

Norkus, Powell In Scrap

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Spurred by the announcement that the winner will be considered a contender for a shot at Rocky Marciano's title, heavyweights Charley Norkus of Port Washington, N.Y., and Charlie Powell, San Diego, battle it out here tonight in a scheduled 10-rounder.

It promises to be a brawl. The pair are swingers with not much in the way of ring science.

The fight will be nationally televised from the Civic Auditorium, starting at 10 p.m., EST, over CBS network.

Al Weil, manager of Marciano, announced here yesterday he would consider the winner a contender for a possible crack at the crown next summer. Marciano is here to referee one of the preliminaries and will take a good look at the main combaters.

Powell, a 6-foot-3 fast puncher, will be making his TV debut after scoring knockouts in his last 10 bouts. He's strictly on the green side, with only 33 rounds of fighting behind him, but he throws leather swifter than any heavy seen around here in years.

Norkus, 4 feet 11½, will give away height and weight but it doesn't bother him. He's had a lot more experience and has faced better opposition than Powell. The Easterner is expected to weigh between 190-200 and Powell, 212.

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Big Ten's Kick Out Of Bounds

CHICAGO (AP) — The Big Ten's kick for regional television appears out of bounds these days. Three conference teams have already appeared on the national screen with a fourth and possibly the best coming up.

Two weeks ago TV fans saw Iowa whip Michigan State. Last week Stanford humbled Illinois and on Saturday's menu is the Wisconsin-Rice encounter.

Moegle is the same youngster whose runs so infuriated Alabama in the Cotton Bowl last January that a 12th man got off the bench to tackle the Owl speedster when he was clear and away to a 90-yard touchdown jaunt.

Moegle hasn't let up since. Against Rice victims Florida and Cornell this year, he has averaged 13.7 yards in 16 carries. The first four times he got his hands on the ball against Cornell, he swept for touchdown runs of 18, 40, 19 and 76 yards.

BROUGHT OUT
Race publicist Bill Whitmore, telling the Chicago football writers about Moegle yesterday, brought out that Dicky was quite a player even before the bowl game.

"He was sixth in rushing nationally last year with 833 yards," said Whitmore. "Of course he was in the shadow of All America Kesse Johnson, our fullback last year. Johnson rushed for 944 yards but he had 73 more carries than Moegle."

Whitmore said he believes the Wisconsin game will be a matter of Rice offense against Wisconsin defense, qualifying that he wasn't selling the Badger offense short.

Wisconsin's answer, of course, is Ameche. But that's not all. Badger quarterbacks Jim Miller and Jim Hains are passing at a .760 clip this season.
