Improper Heating Devices Are Cause Of Many Fires

Many deaths in farm and home fires were due to improperly cared oil-burning equipment according to the National Fire Protection Association, the United States Department of Agriculture and state agricultural extension services.

More than half of the victims of such fires were children under fourteen, according to a report on

oil-burning equipment fires by the NFPA, sponsor of Fire Prevention Week, October 3-9.

To stop this loss of life and cut damage to farm property, the NFPA urges observance of these suggestions for oil heater operations:

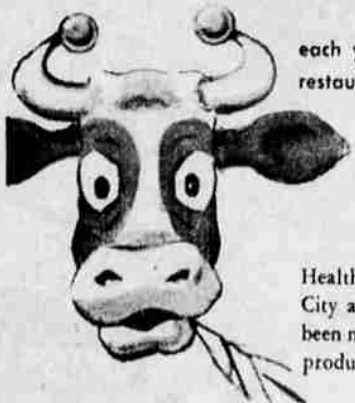
Locate a heater where it is not likely to be tipped over and where a possible fire will not block escape from bedrooms. Make sure the burners are level. Keep curtains, bedding and other combustibles away from the burner. Remember an oil stove or heater should not be tended by children.

When refilling a heater, be sure it is off and cool. In pouring oil, use a funnel and metal container with a pour spout. Keep equipment clean and use the proper grade of oil for your burner.

Once the heater has been turned on, make sure the burner is burning steadily before leaving it. Have a skilled maintenance man make all repairs.

Mrs. Ayoutt will operate the place similarly except she will also serve regular dinners on her menu with a feeling for the guy who is really hungry.

The restaurant business is a little like the grocery store business in that it's a killer on legs and energy long hours and an endless running on hard floors. But where there are two or three in a family who can be on hand in a broken shift arrangement, the operation should be more satisfactory and workable. Here's hoping the new proprietress a full quota of success.

This Saturday night, Oct. 2, comes the biggest Grange event of the year — Grange Booster night! Usually this consists of only a program, dancing and a supper. But this year there will be a grand hall dedication formalities at which the state grange master, Mr. McClure will preside. It will be open to every granger. The matter of sheeting the ceiling and roof joists and placing insulation between is under consideration by the board who held a meeting last Sunday morning to consider finances and to review the progress being made. The insulation would pay, they believe, in saving of heat required to keep the building above freezing temperature. But the sticker right now is financing. Donations are not keeping pace with building costs so the board is having to halt the work for the time being until more donations come in.

The front 10 x 10 doors are yet to be purchased and installed. The rear door is to be hung and the overhead insulated according to the original plan before the building is finished for winter use. This date of completion depends on how fast the money comes in.
