Skill Ball Fails Test

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Santa Monica's "skill ball" game, a judge has found, are much too costly to be a matter of skill.

Superior Judge Frank G. Swain, who tried "em on the spot, ruled yesterday that the games violated the California law.

The average player, said the judge, was not prepared to compete "any more than I could compete against Joe Louis."

The judge ruled in favor of Nathan Schur, who sought an injunction against six operators. "The city of Santa Monica cannot license a game that is prohibited by state law," the court declared. The bingo-type games were said to gross a million dollars a month.

Tule Camp Filled Up

TULELAKE — The Tulelake Growers Association labor camp is filled almost to capacity, according to Cliff Jenkins, association secretary. In addition, several barracks buildings are also filled with farm labor not associated with any contractor. They are available to work as individuals or families.

The trailer court in Newell is beginning to fill up with harvest workers, also. Jenkins stated, Bill Bray is in charge of the trailer camp which has a capacity of 64 trailers.

The potato growers of the area met in Tulelake last week and established rates for the 1954 potato harvest:

Picking, 6 cents per 60-pound stub; bucking and swamping, 80 cents per ton; hauling, \$1.20 per ton; contractor's fee, 40 cents per ton; other labor, such as working on bulkers, cellar men, etc., \$1.25 per hour.

It was the feeling of the group that these rates were high enough that they should stand for the entire season.

Power Output Shows Gain

NEW YORK (AP)— Electric power output in the United States last week rose compared with the preceding week and was 8.8 per cent higher than for the like week last year, Edison Electric Institute reported Wednesday.

Power production totaled 9,158,000,000 kilowatt-hours last week compared with 9,072,000,000 kilowatt-hours the previous week and 8,414,000,000 kilowatt-hours in the week ended Oct. 3, 1953.

All regions of the country showed an increase over the year-ago week except the Rocky Mountain region which declined 2.9 per cent. Pacific Northwest up 4.4 per cent.

On Friday, Ullman is slated to address political gatherings in Merrill and Malin. At 6:30 p.m. he will be the guest of honor at a potluck dinner sponsored by Democrats of the South Suburban District at the Klamath County Fairgrounds. The dinner is scheduled to start at 6:30 p.m.

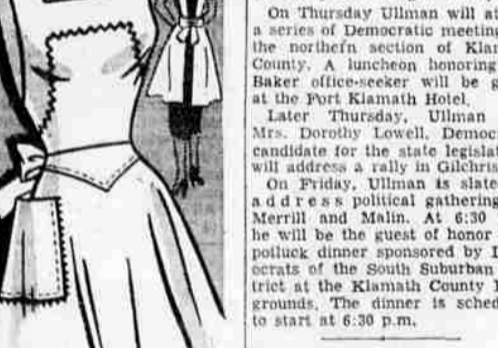
Just Hold Your Breath And Live

GOSPORT, England (AP)— The British Navy is working on a new system of escape from crashed submarines—just hold your breath, open a hatch and jump out.

Navy experts demonstrating the new system here say the oxygen masks used in normal escape apparatus hold hidden dangers. They say, showed men died from oxygen poisoning while trying to reach the surface.

The new scheme followed a tip-off from the navy's "frogmen" divers. They pointed out that no man with air in his lungs could drown on his way to the surface from medium depths because pressure gradually forces the air out and makes it physically impossible to breathe in.

NAAWP Defies Court Try

DOVER, Del. (AP)—A court attempt to revoke the charter of the National Assn. for the Advancement of White People has brought a promise from its president that the NAAWP will pursue its course throughout the country.

Bryant Bowles took this stand yesterday in Philadelphia after Delaware Atty. Gen. H. Albert Young began legal action in the Court of Chancery here to have the association's charter revoked.

Bowles said that if the association lost its charter in Delaware "we will go into the 47 other states and seek franchises, and failing that, we will take to the U.S. mails."

Young said he based his attempt to have the charter revoked on the grounds that active NAAWP opposition to racial integration in the high school at Milford, Del., violated that section of its charter which promises to "promote and protect the constitutional guarantees of citizenship in the United States."

Chancellor Collins J. Sykes ordered the NAAWP to appear Oct. 22 to show cause why a preliminary injunction should not be issued preventing it from further exercise of its corporate powers. He directed the attorney general's office to file a detailed complaint on or before Oct. 14 and gave the NAAWP until Oct. 20 to file a counterclaim.

PULLED BACK

TOEYO (AP)—North Korea's Pyongyang radio announced today that 87,894 Red Chinese soldiers—who made up the seven divisions of "volunteers" in the Korean War—have now been pulled back into China.

The Red broadcast, monitored here, said the last troops crossed into Manchuria Oct. 3.

Along with the troops went 24 tanks and 2,362 guns of all types, the radio said.

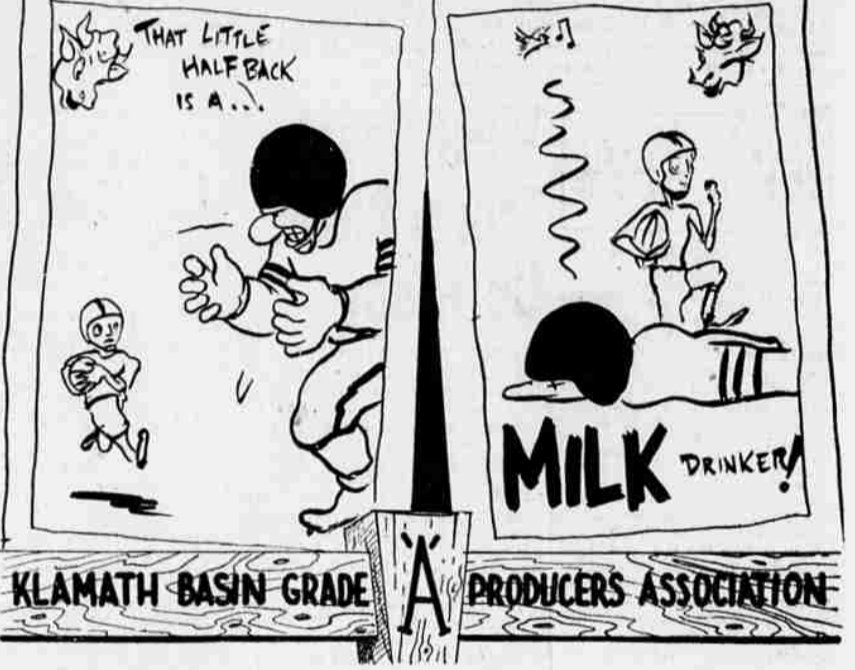
