In a game that may decide the County League football race before the season is halfway over, the undefeated Chiloquin Panthers and the untied Malin Mustangs meet head-on in a league game at Chiloquin Saturday afternoon at 1:30.

Coach Jim Conroy's Mustangs are the pre-season favorites to cop their second straight county championship, but the Malin coach stated before the season got underway that Chiloquin would be the team to beat if his club were to be victorious again this season.

In two league games so far this season, Chiloquin has dumped Sacred Heart and Bonanza by decisive scores, while Malin has turned in wins over Bonanza, Tulelake and Henley in non-conference ball games.

The Panthers will rely on the passing arm of Vernon Joe and other pitching and running ability of Jo Jo George to carry them to an upset win over the favored Mustangs. For Malin, Pat Madden the speed-merchant of the lower Klamath Basin leads the potent Mustang offense while Marshall Cornett and Glen Steyskal add further insurance to the backfield positions.

In other County League action, Sacred Heart travels to Merrill Friday, while Henley, an A-2 independent school in the county, takes to the road for a game at Eagle

Point Saturday. Game times are 3:30 and 2:00 respectively.

Merrill will be trying to keep their win record straight, while the Trojans of Sacred Heart will go looking for their first league victory and keep in the running for league laurels, should the favorites topple during the season.

Ray Rader's Husky eleven will be led by the running of back Leroy Johnson and Dale McCulloch, while Earl Lopez sparks the Merrill line play. # Lederman Criticizes Officials

SEATTLE (AP)—The Washington-Oregon State football game at Portland last week was a "rough game with a lot of piling on," Husky quarterback Sandy Lederman said here Wednesday.

But Lederman, who broke a leg during the first half, said he didn't think the Beavers were "trying to get me out of the game," as charged by a Seattle sportswriter this week.

Emmett Watson, writing in The Post-Intelligencer Tuesday, asserted Oregon State had "declared open season" on Washington quarterbacks. Two others—Bobby Cox and Mel McCain—were injured in the game but will play against UCLA this Saturday.

Both Kip Taylor, OSC coach and Spec Keene, the school's athletic director, have labeled as "absolutely not true" implications the Beavers tried to hurt the Washington players.

Lederman said the accident that sidelined him for the season happened on a split-T play.

"An Oregon State man got me high and held on. I braced myself hoping to get the piltouch long enough to get the piltouch away, but other tacklers kept piling up and after awhile I felt something give and heard something snap."

The quarterback criticized officials who he said "just let the game get out of hand." He said the Beavers were "pulling the same things in the first quarter that the officials finally got around to calling near the end."

Face masks worn by the OSC players appeared to add to their confidence and "they didn't seem to think they could get hurt," Lederman said.
