

Pelicans, Ashland Battle Tonight

Klamath Seeking Third Win

A determined bunch of Ashland Grizzlies invade Klamath Falls tonight to meet the Klamath Union High School Pelicans in a non-conference football game on Modoc Field. Game time is 8 o'clock.

The Pels have a streak of two straight wins going and word from the valley is that the Grizzlies are after a victory which would put a stop to any thoughts that the Pelicans had on running up a large string of wins.

Coach John McGinnis' Whitebirds will be the heavy favorites and the Grizzlies the underdog in a top high school grid battle that should supply plenty of gridiron excitement.

OUTINGS

In their last two outings, the Pels have won two games. They toppled Eugene in a wild scoring 26-19 contest, then the following week turned back a tough Redding contingent in the final period of play by a 19-12 score.

Ashland on the other hand has won one of their last two games, while dropping the other. Grants Pass dumped the Grizzlies by a 34-12 count, while their win came from Lakeview by a 25-19 score.

Gene Allison, head Ashland coach has been working his boys hard for an upset win over the fast improving Pelicans. The guard spots will be taken care of by Bill Workman and Alvin Lorenz with big Phil Sword getting the opening call for the center position.

ATTACK

Leading the attack for the Ashland school will be a backfield comprised of Lance Locke, Jerry Mickle, Verle Yales and Harry Johnson with more running strength expected from Greg Furry, a transfer from Washington, who looked very good against Lakeview last Friday.

The probable starting lineup for Ashland's forward wall will be Dave Carter and Gene Parent at the end spots, while Gene Long and Dale Jeffers will hold down the tackle positions. The guard spots will be taken care of by Bill Workman and Alvin Lorenz with big Phil Sword getting the opening call for the center position.

For coach McGinnis and the Pels, Elvis Mitchell will be one end spot, while one of four juniors may be at the other wing spot in place of Guy Munsell, who was injured in the Redding game.

CANDIDATE
Letterman Larry Heaton leads the four end candidates with big Earl Ticheon, Bill Badorek and Leon Brown all capable of handling an opening call from linecoach Harry Russell.

The remaining spots in the line will probably go to Martin Causey, Jim McCreer or Bob Harshbarger at the two tackle positions, with Modesto "Mighty Mo" Jimenez and Ron Morris at the guard spots. The center position will be handled by Denny "Little Moose" Todd.

In the KUHS backfield will be Larry Yarnell at the quarterback slot, with halfbacks Dave Peppie and Scotty Hancock, the probable starters. Gerald Del Fatti, senior letterman, will probably get the starting call for the fullback position.

Others who could get an opening call at the starting lineup are guards, Vince "Pee Wee" Reece, Dick Clark and Roy Ropp, while Wayne Rodgers is a possible starter at the center position.

HARD RUNNING

Halfback duty is also expected from the hard running Chuck Guphill and Jack Sunitsch, while Larry Dearing and Jim Borden will also see their share of duty at the two twin backfield spots. Dave Leeling might also get the opening nod at the fullback spot, should Gerald Bevans, backfield coach, need the power.

A possible dual of individuals might hold out tonight's encounter as Gerry Mickle is supposed to be loaded with plenty of passing ability, while Klamath's Larry Yarnell has an arm that is capable of throwing with some of the best high school quarterbacks in the state.

On the ground, Mel Johnson and Greg Furry will probably be the two big guns for the Ashland offensive thrust, while Dave Peppie and Scotty Hancock will do the opposing for Klamath's ground maneuvering.

Game time is 8 o'clock and general admission tickets as well as a few reserved seat duets will be placed on sale at the gate.

Owners Meet On A's Feat

CHICAGO (AP) — The meeting of American League club owners in Chicago Tuesday to try to decide what is going to happen, if anything, to their poor relatives, the Philadelphia Athletics, could be a stormy one.

At present, the man of mystery in the bidding for the club's franchise is Tommy Richardson of Williamsport, Pa., president of the Eastern League and a member of the A's board of directors.

He is a mystery only to the extent that nobody seems certain if he really has the backing of wealthy friends to the tune of \$3,750,000 to match the bid of Arnold Johnson, the Chicago financier who wants to move the A's to Kansas City.

The Chicago Tribune Friday said it has learned that Richardson "has told intimates he has succeeded in raising funds to meet the \$3,750,000 purchase price."

Will Harridge, American League president, told the Chicago Sun-Times "Johnson is the only bidder who has backed it up with real money."

As the props are being set, Bill Vecek is sitting in the wings. He is in Chicago as an "interested spectator." He can't help but think that another delay may give Los Angeles a chance to enter the auction.

Irish Meet Winless Pitt

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Winless Pitt goes against Notre Dame Saturday in an intercollegiate clash that could spell the difference between a good or poor season for the sophomore-studded Panthers—even though it's only their third game.

Notre Dame is the high spot of Pitt's schedule. The game has attracted a capacity throng of 62,000—largest in 15 years.

A Pitt victory would do much to bolster the stock of coach Lou Holtz (Red) Dawson, now on the last year of a three-year contract, and probably would pacify many fans and alumni who have been loudly critical of the team's 1954 showing—and Dawson.

Tom Hamilton, Pitt athletic director, predicted earlier this week that the Panthers would bounce back against Notre Dame.

That opinion isn't shared by the oddsmakers, who have made Notre Dame a better than three-touchdown favorite.

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Southern Cal Risks Unbeaten Grid Mark

Southern California, which may be one of the nation's best college football teams, risks its unbeaten record against a youthful and unpredictable Texas Christian team tonight (Friday), but whatever the talented Trojans do is likely to be forgotten once the rush of Saturday's big games gets underway.

So far this season, Southern California has crushed Washington State and Pittsburgh and barely squeaked past Northwestern — a three-game record that hasn't impressed the experts enough to earn the Trojans a top rating. The TCU youngsters were fast and fiery enough to throw a scare into Oklahoma, now the No. 1 team in the

weekly Associated Press poll, but they followed that by dropping a close decision to Arkansas.

NIGHT CARD

This game tops a slender Friday night card that also includes Miami (Fla.) vs. Holy Cross, Denver vs. Montana and Davidson vs. Presbyterian.

Then on Saturday come such games as Oklahoma vs. Texas at Dallas, Wisconsin vs. Rice (the televised Game of the Week) Purdue vs. Duke and Stanford vs. Navy.

Oklahoma moved to the front in the national ratings last week while refraining from competition in anticipation of the Texas game while other leaders were being engulfed in a wave of upsets. With Gene Calame, their star quarterback, still out of action and sophomore Jim Harris taking his place, the Sooners may be in for a bad time this week.

REINSTATE

Oklahoma coach Bud Wilkinson admits he has a better than fair team and he thinks Harris can do the job. But Texas, beaten by Notre Dame two weeks ago, looks on this game as an opportunity to reinstate the idea that it is by far the best team in the Southwest.

The Rice-Wisconsin meeting brings together two of the season's most talented and colorful backs on any major teams. It's Rice's Dicky Moegle, a speedy, elusive runner against Wisconsin's Alan (The Horse) Ameche, a mobile mountain who crushes opposing tacklers. Wisconsin is the No. 3 team in this week's AP poll behind Oklahoma and UCLA.

DAY OF GLORY

Purdue, which had its day of glory in beating Notre Dame, runs into a well-balanced, experienced Duke team that has a wealth of good backs. They're fifth and sixth, respectively, in the weekly ratings.

Stanford, a lightly regarded team until it whipped Illinois before the TV spectators last week, can establish itself more strongly by beating a high-scoring Navy team in the day's top game on the Pacific Coast. Second-ranked UCLA has a comparatively soft one against Washington.
