**Fire Takes Baled Hay**

MERRILL — Children of transient families here for the potato harvest were credited with starting a fire while playing with matches that burned 85 tons of stacked baled hay Thursday. The hay, owned by the Hammond

Ranch operators was last year's cutting and not subject to combustion.

Potato harvesters are camped across the state line road where the crop was stacked.

This year's crop of 275 tons, nearby was saved by the Merrill Fire Department which stood by most of last night. The loss was covered by insurance.

The department answered a call earlier in the afternoon to the ranch owned by Dr. Frank E. Trotman on Highway 39 at Lost River, where a burning power pole fell and set fire to a stubble field. The ranch home is occupied

by Mr. and Mrs. Jess Trotman, parents of Dr. Trotman.

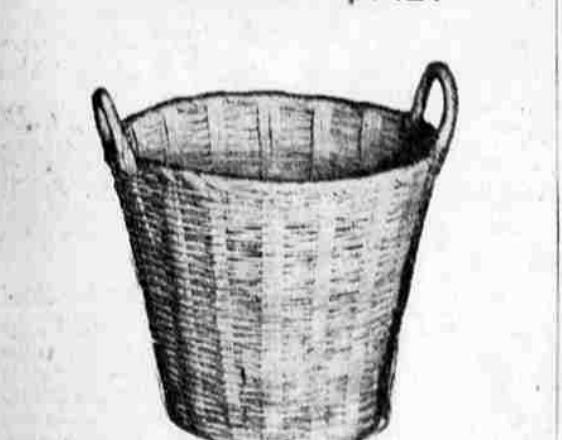
