Patterson Liked In Ring Bout

Floyd Patterson, the Brooklyn 19-year-old who showed real punching power in his last start, is a 1-3 choice to score his third straight victory tonight at the expense of San Francisco's Enau Ferdinand at New York's St. Nicholas Arena.

The bout is limited to eight rounds because you have to be 20 to go 10 in New York state. Patterson, fourth-ranking light heavyweight contender, generally doesn't have to worry about distance any way. In winning 15 of 16 pro bouts, he has scored 10 knockouts. In his last outing Aug. 2 against Tommy Harrison, he won on a first-round knockout.

Ferdinand, making his New York debut, has a 39-10-7 record with 10 knockouts.

Starting at 10 p.m. EST, the scrap will be telecast by Du Mont to some parts of the country.

Bobby Dykes of Miami and Ted Olla of Milwaukee, a couple of stiff-punching middleweights, collide in a 10-rounder tonight at Brooklyn's Eastern Parkway Arena. Dykes is a 5-8 favorite to record his 10th victory. Starting time is 10 p.m. EST, for the ABC telecast.

The top fight of the light week is scheduled for Syracuse's War Memorial Auditorium Friday night when Carmen Basilio, the top-ranking welterweight contender, meets Alvin Gromik of Detroit in a 10-rounder.

Detroit Rolls Over L.A.

If anybody plans to knock off the Detroit Lions for the National Football League championship this season, they've got their work cut out for them. The Lions aren't going to be easy to budge.

A case in point is what happened to the Los Angeles Rams yesterday at Detroit. In past years the Lions just rolled over and played dead for the Rams, winning only 4 of 17 meetings since 1946.

Yesterday the best the Rams, admittedly still shaken by the bruising tie with San Francisco's 40ers the previous weekend, could do was a field goal as Detroit rolled to a 21-3 triumph.

Not once did Norm Van Brocklin, the Rams' ace passer, get off one of his famed touchdown heaves. And when he tried to direct the Rams on a ground attack Detroit's defense bunched up to give up just 61 yards.

The victory — constructed on a 1-yard plunge by Tom Dublinski, a pass interception and Lew Carpenter's 60-yard scoring run — gave the Lions a 2-0 record in the Western Division and set them up for a Saturday night home encounter with twice-beaten Baltimore of the Eastern Division.

The only other unbeaten team in the Western Division had a tough time staying that way yesterday. The 40ers found themselves seven points down in the final period at Green Bay, but with the help of Y. A. Tittle, who came off the bench with his broken hand, caught fire for a 23-17 victory.

Elsewhere, the Chicago Bears defeated Baltimore 29-9, Cleveland beat the Chicago Cardinals 31-7 and New York ran wild against Washington 31-21. Philadelphia beat Pittsburgh 24-22 Saturday night.

Tittle, injured in the Rams' game, rushed in against the Packers and 11 plays later the 40ers were only one point back. Again at work, Tittle tossed a 53-yard pass that carried to the 16 and five plays later he himself pushed over from the 2 for the deciding TD.

Philippine Hoopsters In Portland

NEW YORK 10 — Sugar Ray Robinson, who retired as middleweight champion nearly two years ago to launch a new career as a tap dancer, has announced that he will gradually begin training today with a view to taking up his old trade again. Says that, despite all his real estate holdings in Harlem, he finds himself short of spending money.

If it were anybody except the 34-year-old Sugar Ray talking, this would be the most exciting pugilistic news of the week. A match between him and the current 160-pound king, Bobo Olson, still would draw well into six figures. But it was never possible to know whether this great ring attraction was talking straight or just talking, and it isn't now.

Up to within a few days of his retirement, Robinson continued to insist that he intended to defend his title against Randy Turpin of England. And all the time he was rehearsing diligently for his stage debut. The promoting IBC, therefore, is eyeing the present "comeback" very warily lest it find itself suckered into giving Ray some needed publicity for his stage efforts.

The feeling here was that something broke in Robinson on that terribly hot night two summers ago when Joey Maxim, the then light heavyweight champion, beat him into a babbling wreck. We felt then that he would not enter the ring again, that he had taken the only bad beating he intended ever to take. It still goes.

Another former fighter turned thespian, Lou Nova, has been in our midst lately between night club engagements, and he's still as full of ideas he was a dozen years ago when he was inventing his famous "cosmic" punch. Lou's latest obsession is that boxers should do all their prefight training after dark.

"They fight after dark, don't they?" he demanded. "The former heavyweight contender. So what do they do? They spend a month or more boxing every afternoon at 3 o'clock and then hitting the hay at 10 o'clock every night."

Cougars Bounce OSC 34-6
PULLMAN, Wash. 10 — With speedy Duke Washington and Bob Iverson showing the way, Washington State College scored almost at will Saturday in walloping Oregon State 34-6 in a Pacific Coast Conference football game here.

Washington rambed 60 yards for one touchdown and Iverson, a second string quarterback scored twice and passed for a third counter.

Fumbles proved costly to the Beavers. Their only score came in the third quarter after WSC had run up a 20-0 lead when Ray Westfall passed to Jack Peterson on a 68 yard touchdown play.

The Cougars took the ball 67 yards downfield after the opening kickoff with Frank Sarno passing to Russ Quackenbush for the initial tally.

Washington raced 60 yards off tackle in the second period for another touchdown and Iverson scooted 47 yards for the final first half six-pointer. The Cougars cashed in on a poor punt and Iverson passed 26 yards to Pete Toomey to wind up the scoring in the fourth period.

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Webfoots Upset California 33-27

BERKELEY, Calif. 10 — Oregon spotted California two touchdowns Saturday then with quarterback George Shaw masterminding the maneuvers applied the pressure in the middle periods for a 33-27 Pacific Coast Conference football upset.

Shaw, who had been nursing an injured leg, didn't get into the game until the second quarter after the Bears had rolled to a 13-0 lead. Before the half ended Shaw had paced the Ducks to a 13-13 tie and had his team ahead 33-13 when he left the game at the end of three quarters.

California quarterback Paul Larson came back with two Bear touchdowns — on a 17-yard pass

and a 56-yard punt return — in the final period but time ran out before the Bears could get another drive going.

Two intercepted passes and a recovered fumble set up three Oregon touchdowns in the third quarter.

Shaw scored the first, racing around left end, and converted. End Hal Reeve intercepted a California pass and ran 34 yards to the Bear one. Jasper McGee plunged over.

What proved to be the winning touchdown came when Oregon recovered a California fumble and sent Dick James nine yards over tackle.

Navy Finds Talent

ANNAPOLIS, Md. 10 — Where did this football talent seem to come from suddenly on the undefeated Navy squad?

The Middies, three-time winners, vaulted into the national limelight Saturday with a smashing 23-0 victory that dumped Stanford from the undefeated ranks.

They came home from that one to a terrific welcome last night. Tenthred Court in front of the Midshipmen dormitory was dark when the boys pulled in, but within seconds it was brilliantly lighted and filled with 5,000 shouting midshipmen.

STRANGE
Some of the names they hailed were strange to last year's varsity roster.

Some were buried among the jayvees or so far back among the varsity substitutes that only their parents knew they were there.

Tick Echard caught public attention as one of these Johnny-come-latelies.

Hardly anyone heard of him until the Dartmouth game, when an injury to first-string quarterback George Welsh gave him his chance. Echard threw two touchdown passes to pull Navy ahead.

Echard had been playing football at the academy for three years, with the plebes (freshmen) and the junior varsity.

He's no exception. There are two other seniors in the first-string line, Len Bend at guard and Bob Davis at center, who haven't earned a varsity letter yet.

At tackle is Jim Royer, who also played on the jayvees last year and at end Jim Owen, who was fourth string on the varsity.

At the start of the season, Coach Eddie Erdelatz admitted it sounded trite but said most of any success the Navy team had would be due to "a great desire to play football."

DETERMINED
Echard is more than bearing him out. The 168-pounder from Peoria, Ill., was described in Navy's publicity brochure as "determined to see varsity action. Will not concede the starting assignment at quarterback to anyone."

There were two letter winners ahead of him, Welsh and John Weaver. He threw two more touchdowns passes against Stanford. Coach Erdelatz is going to have a hard time keeping anyone ahead of him now.

Red Sox Released Boudreau
BOSTON 10 — The Boston Red Sox Monday hired Frank "Pinky" Higgins to manage the American League ball club for the next two years. He will replace Lou Boudreau who ran the team the last three seasons.

Higgins, former star major league third baseman, has been managing in the Red Sox system for the past eight years. He piloted the Louisville Colonels in the triple A American Assn. to the Little World Series title this season, defeating Syracuse of the International League in the best of seven interleague series which ended Saturday.

Boudreau had one year to go on his Boston contract. General Manager Joe Cronin told a gathering of baseball writers: "Gentlemen, the Red Sox have decided to make a change in managers."

He said the Red Sox will "meet the obligation" insofar as the second year of Boudreau's current contract is concerned. He added that if Boudreau should get another job in baseball any necessary adjustment will be made.

Higgins, a Texan, began his major league career immediately after his 1930 graduation from the University of Texas, signing with the Philadelphia Athletics.

After two years in the minors, in 1931 with Dallas and San Antonio, and 1932 at Portland, he played for four years with the As. He was with the Sox in '37 and '38 and the next seven years with Detroit, returning to Boston for his final active season in '46.

The next year he began his apprenticeship as a manager, piloting Roanoke, Va., a Sox farm in the Class B Piedmont League. Higgins was there two years, then two with Birmingham and the past four with Louisville.

Ex-WSC Star Admitted To Hall Of Fame
PULLMAN 10 — Mel Hein, center on Washington State's 1930 Rose Bowl team, was admitted to football's Hall of Fame Saturday.

Hein, now line coach at the University of Southern California, was unable to be present for the ceremony and the award was given to his proxy — former WSC coach Orrin (Babe) Hollinberry.

In accepting the Hall of Fame certificate, Hollinberry described Hein as the "greatest man who ever got over a football in this country. . . an All-American all the way."

The award was made at half-time of the Washington State-Oregon State game.

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Canada, Smith Lead Owls To 45-6 Victory

LA GRANDE 10 — Oregon Technological Institute Owls, victims of three early season defeats, rose up to slaughter the Eastern Oregon College Mountaineers here Saturday night 45 to 6 in the first Oregon Collegiate Conference game for both teams.

The Owls dominated first quarter play, letting the Mountaineers gain nary a first down midway in the first period the Mountaineers took over on their own 17 yard line. A pass from Arien Smith to Lawrence "Doc" Savage on the first EOC offensive play of the evening was intercepted by Linous Allen, Owl halfback to set up the play for the ensuing OTI touchdown.

After the Owls had marched from the EOC 42 yard line, halfback Odie Canada took the ball from the one yard line with four minutes remaining in the first quarter. Canada's kick was wide.

FAILED
The Mountaineers, still in the first quarter, failed to buck the OTI 185 pound line and were forced to punt. Flashy halfback Canada took the punt around his right end for a 65 yard gallop to pay dirt. Canada's kick was wide and again the inspired Owls continued their march to victory.

In the second period with another touchdown, a 20 yard pass from quarterback Ray Rosa to Paul Weaver, 200 pound end from Klamath Falls, was good for the first score. The conversion by Cal Smith was good. The Owls lead at half time 19 to 0.

EOC line was like a sieve against the powerful Owls, who scored two more TD's in the third quarter. The fourth tally came as Cal Smith proved himself versatile by taking a fake kick and trotting 29

yards for the tally. His conversion was good.

POWERFUL
About two minutes later the Owls proved themselves all powerful when Weaver took a two yard pass in the end zone of the Owls.

Midway in the final chapter the Owls lost the ball on downs on the Mountaineer two yard line. A fumble by an EOC halfback was recovered in the end zone by a host of OTI linemen read by Bob Stayton, 185 pound guard. Canada's conversion was good with one minute left in the game.

The Mountaineers erased the goose egg on the score board as Savage took a pitch out on a wide sweep around his right end for five yards and a touchdown. Just for good measure the Owls added another TD with five seconds showing on the clock.

A pitchout was taken by Stinson who galloped 70 yards to the end zone. Canada's kick was wide again.

NET YARDAGE
Despite the fact that the Owls received 95 yards in penalties, they chalked up 502 in net yardage for the evening as compared to EOC's 126. OTI also led in the first down department with 17 as against Mountaineer's 11. The Owls attempted 15 passes and completed five while EOC took to the air 20 times and completed only seven.
