Grand Jury To Hear FBI Spy Charges

ALEXANDRIA, Va. (AP)—A specially called grand jury will hear next Monday charges that Joseph S. Petersen Jr. improperly obtained secret documents "with intent or reason to believe" they would help a foreign nation.

Petersen, for 13 years an employee of the supersecret National Security Agency and its predecessor until he was discharged Oct. 1, was arrested on the charge Saturday by FBI agents. He had been under surveillance for some time before that.

Petersen's attorney, David B. Kinney, said meantime he will ask the court to reduce the \$25,000 bond fixed Saturday when Petersen was arraigned before a U.S. commissioner.

Federal Judge Albert V. Bryan Monday ordered a grand jury which sat last June to reconvene next Monday at 10 a.m. to hear the charges. The next regular grand jury would not have met until Dec. 6.

The speeded-up action was asked by attorneys William E. Feoley and John P. Reilly of the Justice Department's Internal Security Division.

Judge Bryan agreed to hear Tuesday Kinney's request for a lowering of the bond fixed for his client. He arrived in court too late to present his motion Monday.

Petersen, who spent the weekend in jail for lack of bond, did not appear at Monday's proceedings, but his wife and his brother, William Petersen of New Orleans, attended.

The complaint on which Petersen was arrested Saturday charged that "from on or about March 1, 1946, to on or about Dec. 31, 1952" Petersen obtained secret documents "with intent or reason to believe that the information was to be used to the injury of the United States or to the advantage of a foreign nation."

The foreign nation was not named. He was picked up by FBI agents at his Arlington, Va., apartment, and waived preliminary hearing. The charge carries maximum penalties of a \$10,000 fine and 10 years in jail on conviction.

Driver Faces Hit, Run Charge

A double case of hit and run driving resulted in the arrest by state police Sunday afternoon of James A. Duerock, 1334 Pleasant.

The arrested man was picked up by state police following two run-ins with cars on Highway 39 north of the state line.

Duerock first hit a parked car driven by Mrs. Hubert Brown, 2701 Boardman, which was stopped for an oil refill. Without pausing, Duerock swerved and hit an oncoming car driven by Darlene Charamza, Menlo Park, California; veered off on a side road and halted when he ran into a borrow pit.

No one was injured. Duerock was cited for drunk driving and failure to stop at the scene of an accident. He was slated to appear in district court at 3 p.m. Monday.
