

Sooners Move Ahead In College Grid Poll

The Associated Press Oklahoma's one-touchdown victory over Texas last Saturday released a landslide of votes today that swept Bud Wilkinson's Sooners far in front in the weekly Associated Press rankings of college football teams.

Out of a total of 201 sportswriters and broadcasters, no fewer than 118 picked Oklahoma first. And not one failed to put the Sooners somewhere in the first 10.

As a result, Oklahoma collected 1,797 points on the usual basis of 10 for a first-place ballot, 9 for second, etc. A week ago, when they had won only two games, the Sooners polled 77 firsts and 1,369 points.

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College Grid Briefs

CORVALLIS (AP) — The Oregon State Beavers are in good physical condition, coach Kip Taylor said Monday as he readied his charges for next Saturday's tilt with Nebraska at Lincoln.

Taylor said the Beavers weren't as bad as the score indicated in their 34-6 licking at the hands of Washington State last Saturday and predicted the Beavers would be vastly improved come this Saturday.

Mentally 110 candidates turned out for opening drills of the freshman team under Coach Dick Twenge.

Twelve high school stars who played in the class A shrine game in Portland last summer and two from the class B game at Pendleton were among the Rooks.

SEATTLE (AP) — Baylor University has a defense as tough as UCLA, the University of Washington Huskies were warned Monday. The Huskies met Baylor at Waco, Tex., this Saturday in an intercollegiate game.

Budd Kerr, who coached Baylor's 21-20 loss to Arkansas, told the Huskies the Bears have a host of speedy backs and a good pass offense. Head Coach John Cherberg told the Huskies they could expect plenty of work on pass defense during the week's drills.

EUGENE (AP) — The Oregon Ducks took it easy Monday, off their upset victory over California last Saturday, but coach Len Casanova said heavy workouts were in prospect the rest of the week as the Ducks prepare for their NCAA "game of the week" television appearance against Southern California.

Casanova said he was pleased with the linemen's work in practicing quarterback George Shaw on pass plays and in rushing Paul Larson and Sammy White, the California aerial artists.

More than two dozen former prep athletes were among the 65 who showed up Monday for the opening drill of five-week freshman football practice season.

Coach Bill Hammer said he was well satisfied with the turn out.

WACO, Tex. (AP) — Injuries will keep Baylor halfback L. G. Dupre and quarterback Doyle Taylor out of Saturday's intercollegiate football game here with the University of Washington.

Coach George Sauer said Monday, however, his other players emerged from last week's game with Arkansas with only minor hurts and will be available for use against the Huskies.

The Bears heard a report on last Saturday's Washington-UCLA game at Seattle. A scout warned the "Texans the man to watch is sophomore quarterback Bobby Cox who sparked the Huskies to three half touchdowns in their 21-20 loss to UCLA."

Cardinals Put Players On Block

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Relief pitcher Al Brazle and outfielder-pinch hitter Harry (Peanut) Lowrey, the two oldest players on the St. Louis Cardinals, were put on the waiver block Monday.

A club spokesman said the action, for the unconditional release of the two veterans, was taken now to give them time to seek other jobs. Both are 39-year men in the major leagues.

Ring Experts Figure Chuck Powell Comer

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The nation's television fans and quite a few boxing experts formed a dim view of the fighting future of California's young heavyweight, Charley Powell, when he was stopped by experienced Charley Norwalk at San Francisco last week.

Submitted Tuesday, however, were a few dissenting reactions.

"That was nothing for a young kid fighting his 13th time," said Al Weill, who just happens to own heavyweights of the world, Rocky Marciano.

Hard-shelled Babe McCoy, a genuine student of boxing and a matchmaker in Los Angeles, saw the bout in person, just as he has seen the ex-professional football player in most of his scraps.

"Powell looked better than he ever did in his brief career," McCoy declared flatly.

The cherubic Babe, admittedly interested in Powell as an attraction for his Olympic Auditorium, added:

"I'm convinced Powell will be a great fighter. Barring, of course, injury to his hands."

Hand injuries are common with inexperienced boxers. And when Powell dislocated a finger in his powerful right hand in the second round, "He was forced to take the defensive and he didn't have the equipment to cope with a strong, tough guy like Norwalk," McCoy said.

Stephen (Suey) Welch, who stepped back into the fight scene to handle Powell after a long absence from the active managing ranks, said Powell will continue to fight. "Jack Dempsey didn't quit when Jim Flynn knocked him out in one round. Did Mickey Walker quit when he got stopped in his eighth fight?"

"One fight, one round, don't make or break a career."

Bobo Olson To Defend Championship

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Carl (Bobo) Olson will defend his world middleweight championship for the third time this year when he meets Joey Giardello of Philadelphia in a nationally-televised 15-rounder in San Francisco's Cow Palace Dec. 15.

Promoter Bennie Ford made the announcement Monday after the match was agreed to by the International Boxing Club.

It was understood Olson would get 40 per cent and Giardello 20 of both net receipts and of \$50,000 for TV rights.

KU Jayvees Top Ashland

Coach Dick Vailencour's Klamath Union High School Jayvees turned in their first win of the season Saturday afternoon at Ashland as they whipped the junior Grizzlies 37-7.

Lee McGill was the big scoring gun for the junior Pels as he tallied four touchdowns, two for 50 and 45 yards, while Dick Dunham and Ken Kuhlman each added one piece. McGill added the only conversion of the afternoon for the Klamath team.

Dunham scored the final touchdown for the visiting junior varsity team as he intercepted an Ashland pass and returned it 60 yards for a score.

Klamath led 18-0 at half, and Ashland scored their lone TD in the fourth period on a downfield drive of 45 yards against the little Pels' defense.

Owners Meet To Decide Home For A's

CHICAGO (AP) — Who will gain control of the Philadelphia Athletics and where will they play in 1955 were the big questions American League club owners hope to decide at a meeting today.

That the debt-ridden Macks will lose control of the franchise which has been in their family for 51 years appeared a virtual certainty unless some "angel" pops up with needed cash.

At a league meeting in New York two weeks ago, Roy Mack was given 14 days to raise \$750,000 to buy control of the team from his father Connie and brother Earle.

UCLA Coach Says Huskies One Year Away

"I don't think Washington is a real good football team," the Bruin coach said. "They will be next year. Right now they have a lot of sophomores and juniors."

Sanders told the writers the Bruins would have several men not in the best of condition for Saturday's game against Stanford.

Jess Hill, boss of the Southern California Trojans, looking ahead to Saturday's game against the University of Oregon, said of the Webfoots' quarterback, George Shaw:

"He's the best back in the Pacific Coast Conference, and the best passer. That includes Paul Larson of California. Our scout, Nick Pappas, says Oregon has a fine football team, a line that averages 212 pounds. I believe we can whip them but we know we cannot make any mistakes."

Hill said his first string quarterback, Jim Contratto, is a doubtful starter in Saturday's national TV Game of the Week because of a spine injury. Contratto is the team's best passer. Orlando Ferrante, first-string guard sidelined five weeks by an injury, is expected to see limited service.

UCLA's star tackle, Joe Ray, is out of the Stanford game and the following week's against Oregon State because of a shoulder separation. It is possible he will not see any more action this season. Sanders rates him "as good as any tackle on the Coast."

Title Fight Criticized By Christenberry

NEW YORK (AP) — The Bobo Olson-Joe Giardello middleweight title match, announced for San Francisco Dec. 15, has drawn sharp criticism from Bob Christenberry, chairman of the New York State Athletic Commission.

"Ridiculous," said Christenberry last night at St. Nicholas Arena. "They made a match with a man (Giardello) in the hospital. I will have more to say about recognition of the bout when the world championship committee meets in London next month."

Christenberry obviously referred to pictures in the morning paper showing Giardello in a wheel chair after an operation to remove a torn cartilage in his left knee at Philadelphia. His surgeons, however, said he should be able to start roadwork in a month.
