Reds Return Allied War Dead
PANMUNJOM, Korea (AP)—The Communists today returned an additional 78 Allied war dead which they said were recovered "as a result of continued investigations."
It was the first delivery of Allied bodies since Sept. 21. Nationalities of the 78 were classified as "unknown." The exchange began Sept. 1.
U.S. POPULATION
WASHINGTON (AP)—The Census Bureau estimates that the population of the United States, including armed forces overseas, was about 162,947,000 on Sept. 1 this year.
That indicated an increase of 2,783,000, or 1.7 per cent, in a year.

Fire Destroys Courthouse

CONDON (AP) — Gilliam County's 51-year-old courthouse was destroyed by fire Monday.
The building was evacuated quickly, and no one was injured. Flames apparently starting at the top of the two-story structure quickly consumed the roof. Many of this community's 1,100 residents joined the volunteer fire department in efforts to salvage county records and documents.
Firemen were hampered by a strong west wind that fanned the flames.
The historic building also houses the county jail.
The building is in the center of a block, and for a time it was feared the flames might spread to other buildings. As a precaution, streets were barricaded for two blocks.
First report of the fire was made by a county worker, Mrs. Lavenna Palmer, who saw smoke drifting from a cupola. Fifteen minutes later, the roof collapsed.
Cause of the fire was not determined immediately.

1st National Statement Announced

Quarterly statement of condition figures for the three branches of First National Bank of Portland located in the Klamath Falls area were reported today by the branch managers.
R. H. Tisdale, vice president and manager of the Klamath Falls branch of First National, reported deposits of \$15,668,761 and loans totaling \$10,861,818, as of September 30, 1954. One year ago, on the same date, deposits were \$15,449,622 and loans amounted to \$11,597,640.
At First National's South Sixth Street branch, manager Myron E. Shannon reports that deposits on September 30, 1954, were \$2,245,330 and loans were \$1,937,978. One year ago the branch reported deposits of \$1,920,891 and loans of \$1,776,319.
M. F. Shelton, manager of First National's Merrill branch, said that deposits there on September 30, 1954 were \$2,378,051 and loans totaled \$2,119,764. One year ago the branch reported deposits of \$2,378,053 and loans of \$1,862,994.
Deposits for the 99 banking offices on September 30 were \$722,844,637, loans were \$341,426,197 and resources were \$798,061,329. All three figures are new all-time highs for the September 30 period.
Over September 30, 1953, total deposits for the statewide system have increased \$135,945,240, loans have increased \$43,200,125 and resources have increased \$153,397,494.
