

Knowland Backs Cordon For Senate Post Re-Election

Sen. William Knowland of California, the Senate majority leader, urged Oregon voters Tuesday to re-elect Guy Cordon to the U. S. Senate.

Knowland told a television audience: "I do not know any other U. S. senator on either side of the aisle who commands more respect and affection from his colleagues than does your hardworking Senator Guy Cordon."

Earlier at a news conference Knowland said the U. S. 7th fleet should be used to resist any attempt by Red China to invade Chinese Nationalist held islands of Formosa.

Cordon, speaking on the same

program, described the plan for "partnership" construction of Gougar Dam on the McKenzie River by the federal government and the Eugene Water and Electric Board.

He denied Democratic charges that he opposed public power. "I will get all I can get from the federal treasurer; I will take every dollar I can get from public sources, and from private sources, until we have built up the hydro-electric power resources we need," Cordon said.

In an earlier talk Cordon denied Democratic charges that he was holding up appointment of a federal judge—leaving it open for himself in the event he is defeated.

"I am not available in the first place because I am going to be re-elected. And in any case, I would not be available because I do not think the appointment should go to a man half way through his 60s... I am not a candidate and never have been," he said.

He defended his opposition to the so-called Hill "oil for education" bill, which he labeled a fraud.

Speaking before a group of lumbermen, Cordon said he favors making O & C timber more accessible to smaller operators.

Gov. Paul Patterson, who also is seeking re-election, reviewed, in a Portland television talk, what he said were the accomplishments of his administration.

He cited his efforts to resolve the Pacific Northwest lumber strike.

He called attention to the spruce budworm control program which he said had saved 14 billion feet of the state's finest timber. In addition, he said, 34 per cent of the Tillamook burn has been reclaimed and reforested by a state financed program.

Discussing agriculture, Patterson said: "Some eight months ago we appeared before the Interstate Commerce Commission and obtained a 10 cent per hundred reduction in the freight rates of our great grain crops moving east. Within the last month, we have

successfully resisted efforts to have this differential reduced."

The state highway construction program, he said, is "designed to make our state more attractive to tourists, our markets more available to the farms and our forests closer to the mills."

Turning to education, Patterson discussed the advancement of college education opportunities. He said this had been done "without neglecting or depleting the attendance at our two great major institutions at the university and state college."

Musical selections featuring a variety of instruments and voices are presented nightly under the direction of Jessie Cameron. These young artists, in cooperation with Mrs. Crist, have arranged some outstanding audio-visual and musical features for the remaining nights of the revival.

Poultry Farmers Seek U.S. Aid

WASHINGTON (AP) — The National Poultry Farmers Assn. held a meeting here Wednesday to map plans to gain government aid in bolstering growers' prices of chickens and eggs.

Many poultry farmers have been complaining that they face bankruptcy unless something is done soon to pull prices of their products back near last year's levels.

The Agriculture Department

started supporting prices of eggs and poultry during World War II, but dropped these programs in 1950 after suffering losses on accumulated stocks of dried eggs.

Largely reflecting a heavy expansion in production, poultry prices have dropped sharply this year. An Agriculture Department farm price report showed that in mid-September, farmers were receiving an average of 33.3 cents a dozen for eggs compared with 51.4 cents a year earlier.

Likewise, farm chickens were selling for an average of 13.3 cents a pound compared with 21.6 cents a year ago, and commercial broilers were bringing an average of 23.3 cents compared with 27.1 cents a year ago.

These price declines have not been accompanied by decreases in cost of poultry feed and in farm wage rates.
