Operation Saves Baby's Life

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP)—Wiley Lawrence Chester, 4 weeks old, is home from the hospital today with his heart back inside his body. And the only thing he has to

show for the operation, performed three hours after birth, is a small scar on the chest. Wiley was brought here from Jeffersonville, Ind., just across the Ohio River, when doctors discovered he had one of the rarest of abnormalities at birth.

The heart, half inside and half outside the body, was enclosed in two fine gelatine-like membranes. The breast bone was only partly formed and several ribs, instead of joining the breast bone at the front, joined each other across the chest. "In 8 or 10 hours, the membranes around the heart would have become like old parchment," said the surgeon who performed the operation. "By that time, it probably would have been too late."

He declined to be identified but said that during the one hour in surgery, the heart was forced back into its cavity while the lungs, which had filled the cavity, were pushed aside to make room. Wiley's mother, Mrs. Palmer Chester says her new son is "doing just fine. He's gained over a pound since birth."
