



PARMESAN BREAD BOXES do more than hold the creamed meat, fish or fowl. By their nature they add richness, flavor and character to a bland filling. This cheese of Italian descent is used as a seasoning for countless good things to eat. Never a dull dish in the menu when Parmesan cheese is around to add the final fillip of flavor to crust of bread of French onion soup, the unusual to scrambled eggs, the crusty-topped counterpane to many a creamed fish or vegetable dish, the enticing appeal to spaghetti with meat balls. Cheese Bread Boxes For Buffet Supper

Cut unsliced bread into 2-inch slices. Cut off crusts or cut with large round or heart-shaped cookie cutter. Hollow out each with a knife (a grape fruit knife does a neat job), leaving sides and bottom about three-eighths inch thick.

From sliced bread cut four rounds for each bread box. From three rounds, using a smaller cutter, remove a circle from center of each. Place the resulting rings on top of the fourth round to form a bread box. (See picture).

Brush all surfaces generously with melted butter, then dip into and sprinkle on lots of grated Parmesan cheese. Place on a cookie sheet. These may be prepared in the morning.

To serve, bake in a moderately hot oven (400 degrees) until the cheese and crust are lightly browned (10 to 20 minutes).

Fill the hot bread boxes with creamed chicken and mushrooms.

Ever try adding lettuce to a hot potato salad? Use the heart of an iceberg lettuce and shred it; save the outer leaves for some other kind of salad.

Egg salad sandwiches for the lunch box taste especially delicious when you add plenty of crumbled, crisply cooked bacon to them.

Party-pretty appetizers are easily made. Put a large spoonful of cottage cheese (the cream style kind) on a slice of bologna. Roll the edges of the bologna over to make a cornucopia and fasten with a cocktail pick. Insert a couple of matchstick pieces of pickle in the center of the cornucopia.

Remove seedless grapes from stems and pile in a glass serving bowl. Top with sweetened whipped cream sprinkled with freshly-grated nutmeg or curls of unsweetened chocolate. To make the chocolate curls use a swivel-blade vegetable peeler and have the chocolate slightly soft.

If you want to cut hard-cooked eggs into clean-looking regular slices slice them after chilling.

Baked bananas make a delicious accompaniment to ham. They may also be used as a dessert.
